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NOTE

This fourth issue of the STATISTICAL BULLETIN covers all available data for the year 1921.

The data for previous years for all statistical tables in this bulletin, with the exception of tables Nos. 2, 4, 5, 22, 23, 24, and 47, may be found in STATISTICAL BULLETIN No. 3 OF THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS FOR 1920, issued by this Bureau.

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BUSINESS CONDITIONS

The wave of financial depression which has been sweeping the world for over two years, has had its effect strongly felt in the Philippines about the last half of 1920, and continued its course during the year under consideration. In fact the Philippines never was nearer a financial panic in its history since the beginning of American occupation. Both the foreign and domestic commerce suffered a tremendous slump,—the foreign trade, by 32 per cent, and the domestic commerce, by 38 per cent. The acuteness of the depression was greatly accentuated, occurring unexpectedly, as it did, almost in the midst of unprecedented business prosperity in the Islands. For the first time in the history of the country, the values of articles imported exceeded those of domestic products exported by ₱55,446,503. This was a tremendous drain upon our funds abroad, and caused the almost sudden recession of the exchange value of our currency.

Foreign trade.—The values of imports, exports, and total trade of the Philippines during the year 1921, as compared with those of 1920, are as follows:

The above figures forcefully demonstrate how far our foreign trade has receded. The values of imports declined 22.5 per cent, and exports, 41.7 per cent. The most important decreases in imports and exports are shown in the following:

Though the values of importation of the islands receded considerably, a detailed examination of the items which entered during the year reveals some compensatory features. Among these is the general decline in the importation of foodstuffs which is highly indicative of the ability of the country to produce what is needed for local consumption. The total importation of foodstuffs during the year amounted to ₱43,498,974, as compared with ₱61,611,767 in 1920, thus giving a decrease of ₱18,112,793, representing 27 per cent of the total decrease in the year's imports.

The values of the exportation of domestic products have been greatly reduced due to the marked decline of prices in the foreign markets. The volume, however, has been maintained, if not increased over the preceding year, as shown by the following:

As usual the United States secured the greatest portion of our foreign trade. During the year it contributed ₱148,260,030 of Philippine imports and secured ₱100,713,586 worth of exports, or 61 per cent of the total trade, as against ₱35,094,966 or 8.6 per cent for Japan, and ₱24,246,278 or 5.9 per cent for China.

Foreign shipping.—Shipping conditions were practically the same as in 1920, only slightly less active. Entrances numbered 871 vessels with a net tonnage of 2,646,455, as compared with 992 and 2,755,752, respectively, in 1920. Clearances numbered 887 with a net tonnage of 2,725,469, as compared with 995 and 2,771,214, respectively, during the preceding year.

Domestic trade.—The chaotic condition of the foreign markets was wholly responsible for the violent decline in prices in the Philippines. The obvious reason is the fact that a very great portion of the islands' produce are sold in foreign countries where not only the demand but also competition with the produce of other countries determine the price. The business boom in the United States was followed by a feverish activity in Philippine markets, and when the United States markets receded, a marked depression in the local market began to be felt. The prices of the staple products may be considered the most reasonable index of business conditions in the islands. The rise of

the index level, therefore, is symptomatic of a favorable reaction in business conditions. Based upon the average prices of 1913, the curve for the first month of 1921 reached the 160.3 level, receding gradually to 99 in September. On December it rose to 108.1.

Manila hemp reached its highest level in April of 1919, 358.9 (₱57.50). By January of 1921, it dropped to 188.6 (₱30.22). It reached its lowest level in September, 114.3 (₱18.31), gradually rising to 122.4 (₱19.60) in October, 122.0 (₱19.55) in November, and 126.5 (₱20.27) in December. With the exception of corn, sugar was the most amenable to fluctuation, rising as high as 683.7, (₱32.75) on June of 1920. By January of 1921 it went down to 210.9 (₱10.10), reaching its lowest level in September, 107.1 (₱5.13). The curve gradually rose to 112.3 (₱5.38) in October, 128.0 (₱6.13) in November, and 119.4 (₱5.72) in December. Coconut oil, tobacco leaf, copra, maguey, rice and others rose and fell in the same manner, though not as violent as those of sugar and Manila hemp. These quotations refer to the average prices based upon all classes of each commodity.

The rates of exchange during the year 1919 oscillated between $4\frac{1}{4}$ to 5 per cent for United States telegraphic transfers and $3\frac{1}{2}$ to $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent for United States demand drafts (Philippine National Bank selling quotations). During 1920, the rates oscillated between 2 per cent on February 21st to $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent on December 29th for telegraphic transfers, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ to $11\frac{1}{2}$ per cent for demand drafts on the same dates. These rates continued for some time during 1921 until on February 16th, they rose $\frac{1}{2}$ point each, 13 per cent for telegraphic transfers and 12 per cent for demand drafts. The maximum was reached when on March 5, selling quotations were 14 per cent for telegraphic transfers and 13 per cent for demand drafts. These rates gradually decreased to 3 and 2 per cent, respectively, on October 8th. By the end of 1921 the rates had risen again to $7\frac{1}{4}$ per cent for telegraphic transfers and $6\frac{1}{4}$ per cent for demand drafts.

The monetary circulation of the Islands began to decrease in June, 1920, when from ₱163,428,638 in May it dropped to ₱162,459,596. It gradually and continually decreased until it amounted only to ₱102,792,488 in November, 1921. In December it rose to ₱103,661,820. On the other hand, banking conditions seem to be more reassuring. By the end of 1921, overdrafts decreased from ₱103,547,009 to ₱70,753,659, while bank loans and discounts increased from ₱116,023,841 in 1920 to ₱131,507,519 in 1921. Bank notes in circulation increased from

₱33,368,942 in 1920 to ₱42,237,752 in 1921. Bank profits average 15.4 per cent during the year.

The total internal revenue collections during the year amounted to ₱48,080,112, as compared with ₱59,371,259 during the preceding year. The bulk of this reduction is due to the decrease in the sales of merchants, manufacturers and peddlers upon which a tax of one per centum is levied. The total sales in 1921 amounted to ₱1,022,896,948, as compared with ₱1,646,463,295 in 1920. Income tax, however, increased from ₱4,252,633 in 1920 to ₱4,964,794 in 1921.

A further evidence in the curtailment of commercial activities, specially in the provinces, is the marked decline in the sale of inter-island demand drafts and telegraphic transfers which began by the end of 1920 and continued progressively downward during the year 1921. Telegraphic transfers (no sales of demand drafts) sold by provincial treasurers on Manila and other provincial treasurers amounted only to ₱375,507, as against ₱1,164,681, including ₱600 demand drafts in 1920, or a decrease of 68 per cent. The total sales of telegraphic transfers (no demand drafts sold) in Manila on provincial treasurers amounted to ₱495,469 in 1921, as against ₱2,212,285, including ₱2,200 demand drafts in 1920, or a decrease of 78 per cent. The total sales of inter-island demand drafts and telegraphic transfers during the year amounted to ₱870,976, as compared with ₱3,376,966 in 1920, or a total decrease of ₱2,505,990 or 74 per cent.

Despite the general business depression throughout the Islands building operations were practically unhampered. The cutting of timber was more active during the year, when 653,944 cubic meters were cut as against 554,997 cubic meters in 1920. In the city of Manila the number of buildings of strong materials constructed during the year was 1,054, as against 1,057 in 1920.

With reference to transportation facilities, the general tendency was downward in both passenger and tonnage movement, although the registration of automobiles increased from 8,341 to 9,738 and motor trucks, from 2,722 to 3,053. The Manila Electric Company reports a decrease in the passenger movement of from 42,702,008 to 40,747,563 in 1921. The Manila Railroad Company, however, reports an increase in tonnage movement of from 806,380 in 1920 to 1,051,551 in 1921, though the passenger movement decreased from 9,282,953 in 1920 to 6,956,149 in 1921. This reduction, however, is partly due to the competition of automobiles and motor trucks operating between the city of Manila and nearby provinces.

The rice problem and situation have entirely been altered. Then it was a problem of importation, now it is evidently a problem of transportation to localities which mainly produce export products. With an increase of 215,513,082 kilos in the production of 1921 over that of 1919, when the rice situation became most acute, the production is now deemed sufficient for local consumption. The total quantity of rice transported to non-producing localities during the year 1921 amounted to 3,810,778 *cavans*, as compared with 2,191,880 *cavans* during the preceding year. Of these, Nueva Ecija exported (by rails only) 806,750 *cavans* against 265,278 *cavans* in 1920, Bulacan, 358,813 against 115,601, Tarlac, 223,813 against 55,972, Pangasinan, 251,813 against 88,850, Pampanga, 192,437 against 55,931, and the rest were transhipped through the ports of Manila, Iloilo, Cebu, etc., from foreign countries. The provinces which imported the greatest quantities during the year were Cebu, 357,408 *cavans*, as compared with 63,848 in 1920, Leyte, 217,723 against 206,180, Occidental Negros, 189,030 against 66,548, Sorsogon, 155,535 against 237,113, Albay, 128,230 against 150,587, Samar, 125,055 against 125,025, and Iloilo, 116,187 against 42,124.

During the year there were registered 291 corporations with a total capital stock of ₱18,616,450, of which 7,957,616 were subscribed and ₱6,148,128 were paid-up. During the previous year there were registered 371 corporations with ₱76,205,801, capital stock of which ₱30,667,640 were subscribed and ₱18,404,078 were paid-up. There were registered in the city of Manila 192 partnerships with ₱13,435,156 capital, as compared with 318 and ₱12,584,718, respectively, in 1920. As shown by these figures, the total investment in corporations and partnerships during 1921 amounted to ₱19,583,284, as compared with ₱30,988,796 in 1920, or a decrease of ₱11,405,512. Investments have thus tremendously decreased, except in partnerships which increased by ₱850,438 only. An encouraging feature, however, is noted in the increasing investments during the last months of the year which augurs a more active investment in the future. August of 1921 was the lowest ebb in investment in corporations when it amounted only to ₱104,100. This rose to ₱594,963 in November, and ₱1,216,078 in December, continuing to rise during the first part of 1922 when the total capital invested amounted to ₱1,928,670 in January.

The foregoing facts are indicative of the transition through which we are undergoing. Barring serious economic disturbances in the process of readjustment, which in this country is fortunately going on smoothly, there should now be less cause for

apprehension as to the future. The highest authorities in finance and business in the United States and even in Europe, are generally of the opinion that the turn of the tide is very near, if it has not already come. American businessmen predict the return of normal conditions about the middle of the year. In the Philippines the prospect may be gauged by the continued rise in prices of the staple products during the last three months,—in September the index went down one point below the 1913 level or 99.0, rising gradually to 101.2 in October, 103.1 in November, and 108.1 in December. Although there are a number of adjustments from the effects of the war to be made as yet, there is a general belief in the early return to normal business conditions, stabilized prices, and sounder business opportunities. As business depression is not confined to this country alone, but throughout the whole world, it stands to reason that alone the Philippines can never mend its fences, unless at the same time normal conditions return or prevail in the rest of the world, or a greater portion of it. However, the concensus of opinion is that Europe is now fast recovering from the effects of the titanic struggle,—England is heavily increasing her exports, France and Belgium are steadily building up theirs as a consequence of the rapid internal reconstruction of their industries and agriculture, Germany is now beginning to enter the world foreign trade, and the southern countries are engaged in intensive economic reconstruction. Bolshevik Russia alone, apparently without capital and without credit, is still facing an acute economic and financial crisis. We may therefore expect that, unless some unforeseen events affecting the growing economic stability in this country or in countries with which we maintain intimate commercial relations occur, before the end of the year 1922 business depression in the Islands will have been noticeably diminished.
