Consul Knox to the Earl of Clarendon.—(Received April 18.)

My Lord, Bangkok, February 20, 1866.

Report on the Trade of Bangkok for the Year 1865.

OWING to the small quantity of rain that fell during the season of 1864, the rice crop was so much below the usual average that the Siamese Government considered it expedient to prohibit the exportation of that article.

This prohibition came into effect on the 25th of January, 1865, and ceased on the 21st of August last.

The high prices which the growers, as soon as the effect of the drought became apparent, demanded for their rice, would of itself have been a virtual prohibition to its export; and doubtless the most legitimate one.

The Siamese Government, however, failed to understand that in such matters there was no necessity for their interference, and, as the results would have been the same, whether caused by the shortness of supply or Government interference, I merely drew their attention to the fact, and yielded without remonstrance.

I have reason to believe that the lesson has not been lost on them, and that, on future occasions, this Government will not interfere in such matters.

From inquiries which I have made, it would appear that droughts occur in Siam on an average of once in twelve years. On former occasions the loss was much more injuriously felt than on the last.

Before the Treaty with Great Britain, Siam merely grew enough rice for home consumption; but, since that Treaty, a large export trade in that grain has sprung up, and consequently a great deal more is now planted than can be consumed in the country, even if the Return is only an average one. Thence last year, though the Return was very much below the average, yet, from the greater quantity sown, there was quite sufficient for the-consumption of the people.

The consequences of this drought will, however, be plainly seen in the Tables that accompany this Report. Four-fifths of the exports of this country consist of rice, and having had last year none to export, the whole trade has been, to a great extent, paralyzed.

The present crop, now harvested, is said to be an excellent one, and I therefore hope that my next Report on the trade of this country will be very much more favourable than the present one.

I have to report one beneficial change which has taken place during last year, viz., the abolition of the heavy tax on cocoa-nut trees, which has been replaced by a light one on the oil extracted from the nut.

As the soil and climate of many parts of Siam are particularly well suited to the growth of this palm, a very extended cultivation of it will now probably take place.
