I.—LAND REVENUE.

SINGAPORE.

Land in the hands of private owners in Singapore is held direct from the Crown, either by lease or grant. The terms of the leases vary. A great portion of the land on which the town stands is held on building-leases for 99 years; of these leases, 1,919 are unexpired. The terms of the leases in the country are, for the most part, 99 and 999 years. A grant in a Statutory form is now the only Crown title issued. This is prescribed by Ordinance II of 1886.

The "permits" formerly issued in anticipation of survey have all been called in and grants substituted for them. Certain Crown Reserves are held under annual licences. The quit-rent reserved in leases for lands in the country issued before October 15th, 1883, is 30 cents an acre; that on leases issued subsequent to that date varies according to advantages of soil and situation, but is in no case less than 40 cents an acre. In all leases issued since October 15th, 1883, a condition is inserted under which the rent is re-adjustable every thirty years. Since the passing of the Crown Lands Ordinance of 1886, the only instrument of title is a Statutory Grant in perpetuity subject to a minimum quit-rent of 50 cents an acre re-adjustable every thirty years.

By Ordinance I of 1901 special powers are given to the Government with regard to leases of foreshore for periods not exceeding 100 years.

PENANG.

Land in Penang and Province Wellesley is held of the Crown, as in Singapore, by grant or lease. The conditions of tenure vary according to the policy of the Government at the time the documents were issued. In Singapore eighteen and in Penang twenty different kinds of title are in the hands of the public. Unoccupied Crown land is obtainable on Statutory Grants as in Singapore and Statutory Grants are also being substituted for Permits and Expired Leases. Alienation of foreshore is subject to Ordinance I of 1901.

The rates of rent reserved in old leases vary in different localities.

The following table gives a comparative statement of the Revenue derived from Premia and Land Rents in Penang in the years 1903 and 1904 respectively:—

MALACCA.

The tenure of land in the town of Malacca has remained unchanged since the days of Dutch rule. Possession is evidenced in many cases by documents of title in Dutch. Occupied land in the country is, in some cases, held either under grant or lease from the Crown, but for the most part according to customary tenure as defined by the Malacca Lands Ordinance. There is special legislation, Ordinance I of 1901, for alienation of foreshore.

Land is now obtainable without premium if held under customary tenure, and with premium and a moderate quit rent if held under Statutory Grant.

The principal land revenue consists of rents on tapioca and gambier leases and of mukim assessment under customary tenure.

FEES UNDER CHINESE IMMIGRATION ORDINANCE, CRIMPING ORDINANCE, AND STAMP ORDINANCE.

Under section 10 of Ordinance XXI of 1896, written engagements of Chinese Emigrants shall bear such stamp duty, not exceeding \$1 per emigrant, as may from time to time be fixed by Order of the Governor in Council. By an Order in Council dated 29th December, 1897, the stamp duty on written engagements under Ordinance XXI of 1896, was raised to \$1 each emigrant. Under section 29 of Ordinance XIX of 1902, written engagements of Chinese Immigrant shall bear a stamp duty of \$1 per Immigrant. The Revenue derived from these sources and from sinkkeh redemption receipt stamps in 1904 amounted to \$17,104.26.

FEES UNDER NATIVE PASSENGER LODGING-HOUSES ORDINANCE, XVIII OF 1896.

Under section 5 of this Ordinance a licence fee of \$24 a year or \$2 a month was fixed for Native Passenger Lodging-houses. The Revenue derived from these fees in 1904 was \$2,666.

FEES UNDER THE LABOUR CONTRACT ORDINANCE.

A fee of 10 cents is collected on every contract executed under this Ordinance if the advance to the labourer is \$25 or more.

FEES UNDER THE BURIALS ORDINANCE.

Under section 4 (3) of Ordinance XIX of 1896 a fee of \$100 is paid in respect of every special permit for burying in unlicensed ground. The Revenue obtained from this source in 1904 amounted to \$900.

CONSULAR FEES.

In Penang these fees are paid under the Imperial Consular Regulations. The amount of Revenue obtained from this source in 1904 amounted to \$416.72.

CAUSE OF INCREASE OR DECREASE.

- a. *Increases*:—Singapore, \$10,059.98; Penang, \$2,522.89—*increase in the Rent Roll*. *Decrease*:—Malacca, \$3,767.75, owing to large surrenders of titles in 1903 and 1904 without a corresponding demand for new lands.
- b. *Increase*:—Malacca, \$3,775.83—due to more permits issued to cut timber for Railway sleepers. *Decreases*:—Singapore, \$336.32; Penang, \$1,080.64.
- c. Small increases in the three Settlements, *viz.*:—Singapore, \$336; Penang, \$379.50; Malacca, \$644.
- d. *Increases*:—Penang, \$778.45; Malacca, \$541. *Decrease*:—Singapore, \$127.
- e. *Decreases*:—Singapore, \$267.21; Penang, \$1,897.12; Malacca, \$734.14.
- f. The decreases are principally in Singapore and Penang, *viz.*:—the former \$1,726.58 and the latter \$316.71.
- g. The increase represents the rent on certain houses situated on the newly acquired property by Government in Singapore which are now demolished.
- h & i. Increase on the re-letting of the Farms for the three years from 1st January, 1904.
- j. *Increases*:—Singapore, \$4,837.85; Penang, \$979.50; Malacca, \$251.48.
- k. The decrease is mainly in Singapore, *viz.*:—\$6,390, due to closing of shops. There was an increase of \$1,851 at Malacca.
- l. *Decreases*:—Singapore, \$72,187.30; Malacca, \$3.38—larger sale of *Unified Stamps* at the Post Office, *vide note a* Post Office and Telegraphs, also in a measure to fluctuation in Probate Duty. *Increase*:—Penang \$15,422.17.
- m. *Decreases*:—Singapore, \$825.23; Penang, \$526.92; Malacca, \$63.98.
- n. More vessels clearing the ports of India for the East.
- o. The increase is mainly at Penang, *viz.*:—\$1,058.



- a. *Principal Increases*:—Up-keep of Furniture of Government House, \$2,144.52; Up-keep of Grounds at Government House and Domain, \$918.13; Travelling Expenses of the Governor and Suite, \$600.06.
- b. Due chiefly to less Expenditure on Telegrams; *viz.*:—\$907.26, and Travelling and Personal Allowance of the Colonial Secretary, \$982.60.
- c. There was only one Cadet studying out of the Colony in 1903, for part of the year, in 1904, there were three.
- d. Due principally to less Expenditure in 1903 for Purchase of Printing Paper, etc., by \$3,265.25 and to the payment for Overtime wages in 1904 amounting to \$3,671, which in 1903 was paid as Personal Emoluments. There was a payment of \$1,250 for the Purchase of a New Engine in 1903.
- e. *Principal Increases*:—Purchase of Boundary Stones (recoverable), Malacca, \$3,471.31; Expenses of Work under the Boundaries Ordinance, Singapore, \$518.99.
- f. *Principal Decrease*:—Passage of Officers, etc., \$3,460.77—in 1903 there was a charge by Admiralty for conveyance of a Colonial Officer. *Special item in 1904*:—Expenses in connection with the Exploration of the Island, \$1,252.91.
- g. There was a Special Expenditure of \$20,000 for the Purchase of a New Steam Launch in 1903.
- h. There was some Special Expenditure in 1903.
- i. The increase on Expenses in connection with the Reminting of the New Straits Coin was \$211,630.55, on the other hand, the Decreases were, Cost of Currency Notes, \$18,182.84; Purchase of Stamps, Straits Settlements, \$8,541.55; and there was a Special Expenditure of \$6,766.33, for Dies for Adhesive Stamps in 1903.
- j. Small increases on the Annually Recurrent votes; there was \$968.45 spent on Special Expenditure in 1904 for Purchase of Typewriter and Furniture.
- k. A new item for Stores, Staff, Lights, etc., for Penang Iron Pier in 1904 cost \$6,377.42 and also a Special Expenditure for Floating Fenders, Gangways, Etc., for the Pier cost \$6,942.28; there was also an Expenditure of \$1,724.38 for Maintenance of Steam Disinfecting Lighter *Hygeia*.
- l. *Principal Increases*:—Fuel and water for Steam Tender, \$1,710.98; Maintenance of Buoys, Etc., and Light-house Plant, \$1,957.07; Oil and Stores, \$1,118.53; Rations and Clothing, \$2,145.47, the three last items were for the three Settlements. There was a Special Expenditure of \$2,100 for Purchase of Duplicate Wigham Buoy for the Cyrene Shoal.
- m. Of the Special Expenditure in 1903 there was the final payment of \$86,468.73 for the New Steamer and in 1904 for cost of new Steam Cutter, \$4,585.54, and Additions and Alterations to the New Steamer \$3,840. There was also less expenditure in 1904 for Docking and Repairs and Fuel and Water, the former by \$2,440.99, the latter by \$1,136.86.
- n. Under Special Expenditure in 1904 there was the Purchase of a Steam Launch for the Singapore Post Office, \$16,000 and the excess expenditure of \$1,011.76 for overtime allowance to Clerks, and \$1,283.72 for Bounties to Commanders of vessels for Conveyance of Mails. There were decreases in the items Contribution to Imperial Post Office, \$4,155.41 and Foreign Postage, \$1,815.89.

WHEREAS by Order of Her late Majesty Queen VICTORIA in Council dated the 2nd day of February, 1895, (hereinafter called "the Order of 1895") provision was made with respect to the Currency of the Colony:

AND WHEREAS by "The Straits Settlements Coinage Order 1903" it was among other things ordained and enacted that a Straits Settlements Dollar should be coined and be of the metal weight and fineness specified in the Schedule to that Order and that for the purpose of making the Straits Settlements dollar legal tender in the Colony the Order of 1895 should from such a day as might be fixed by the Governor of the Colony by Proclamation be read and apply as if the Schedule to the Straits Settlements Order 1903 were added to the Second Schedule of the Order of 1895.

NOW, I, Sir FRANK ATHELSTANE SWETTENHAM, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Straits Settlements, in exercise of the power vested in me by the Straits Settlements Coinage Order 1903, and of every power enabling me in that behalf, do by this Proclamation fix the 3rd day of October, 1903, as the date from which the Order of 1895 shall be read and apply as if the Schedule to the Straits Settlements (Coinage) Order 1903 were added to the second Schedule of the Order of 1895.

GIVEN at Singapore, this 2nd day of October, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and three.

ORDER OF HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN IN COUNCIL OF 2nd FEBRUARY, 1895.

Whereas by virtue of the Act passed in the Session of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Our reign, chapter one hundred and fifteen, intituled "An Act to provide for the Government of the Straits Settlements," and of other powers enabling Us in that behalf, We have power to make laws for the peace, order, and good government of Our Colony of the Straits Settlements;

And whereas by virtue of the law repealed by this Order certain silver dollars and other silver coins, and coins of copper or mixed metal are legal tender in Our said Colony;

And Whereas it appears to Us, by the advice of Our Privy Council, that it is expedient to repeal the said law, and to make a law respecting the coins which are to be the subject of contract and to constitute legal tender in Our said Colony;

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and by virtue of all powers vested in Us in that behalf, do hereby ordain and enact as follows: And the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury, and The Most Honourable the Marquess of Ripon, K. G., one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the requisite directions herein accordingly.

1.—(1) The Straits silver dollar of the standard weight and millesimal fineness specified in the First Schedule to this Order shall be the standard coin of Our Colony of the Straits Settlements in this Order referred to as the Colony.

(2) Every contract, sale, payment, bill, note, instrument, and security for money, and every transaction, dealing, matter, and thing whatever relating to money, or involving the payment of or the liability to pay any money, shall, in the absence of express agreement to the contrary, be held to be made, executed, entered into, done, and had in the Colony, according to the standard coin of the Colony.

(3) The coins mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order shall be treated as equal to the standard coin.

2. If, on the report of the Governor of the Colony, the Commissioners of Our Treasury and a Secretary of State from time to time declare that they consider any dollar not mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order to be equivalent in value to the standard coin, or to any of the dollars therein mentioned, then, after the date fixed by the Governor in a proclamation stating the declaration, and setting forth in a schedule the same particulars with respect to the dollar as are set forth in the said Second Schedule, this Order shall apply as if the schedule to the proclamation were added to the Second Schedule to this Order.

3.—(1) If the Governor of the Colony at any time requests that any new subsidiary coins of less value than the dollar, whether of silver, copper, or mixed metal, be coined, and the Commissioners of Our Treasury and a Secretary of State approve such request, those new coins may be so coined under the direction of the Master of Our Mint, or at one of Our Mints in British India.

(2) Such new coins shall have either the same impressions as the coins specified in the Third Schedule to this Order (in this Order referred to as existing coins) or such other impressions as may be approved of by the Master of Our Mint and by a Secretary of State.

(3) Any such new coin may be of the same denomination as any existing subsidiary coin, or of a different denomination.

(4) Every such new coin, if of silver, shall be of the same fineness as the existing silver coins, and of a weight bearing the same proportion to the weights of those coins as the denomination of the new coin bears to the denominations of the existing coins.

(5) As regards both the existing coins and the new coins the remedy of fineness shall be three-thousandths, and the remedy of weight shall be such that the gross deviation in weight on such number of coins of any given denomination as amount to the value of a dollar shall not exceed that allowed on the British dollar.

4.—(1) A tender of payment of money in the Colony, if made in the standard coin or in any coins specified in the Second or Third Schedule to this Order, shall, if the coins have not been illegally dealt with, and if of silver have not become diminished in weight by wear or otherwise, so as to be of less weight than the weight in that behalf specified in the Schedules to this Order as the least current weight, be a legal tender—

- (a) in the case of dollars for the payment of any amount ;
- (b) in the case of the other silver coins, for the payment of an amount not exceeding two dollars, but for no greater amount ;
- (c) in the case of coins of copper or mixed metal, for the payment of an amount not exceeding one dollar, but for no greater amount.
- (2) Each coin shall be a legal tender only for the amount of its denomination.
- (3) If any new coins are coined, this article shall, after the date fixed by the Governor in a proclamation made with the approval of the Commissioners of Our Treasury and a Secretary of State, setting forth in a schedule the same particulars with respect to each coin as are set forth in the Third Schedule to this Order, apply to the new coins as if the schedule to the proclamation were added to that Third Schedule.
- (4) For the purposes of this Order, a coin shall be deemed to have been illegally dealt with where the coin has been impaired, diminished, or lightened otherwise than by fair wear and tear, or has been defaced by having any name, word, device, or number stamped or engraved thereon, whether the coin has or has not been thereby diminished or lightened.
- 5. On the commencement of this Order the Order in Council of the 21st day of October, 1890, regulating the currency of the Colony, and all other laws regulating legal tender in the Colony shall cease to be in force.
- 6. Nothing in this Order, nor any repealed law by this Order, shall affect any liability incurred, contract made, or other thing done before the commencement of the Order.
- 7. In this Order—
 The expression "Governor" means the Governor of the Colony, and includes the officer for the time being administering the government of the Colony.
 The expression "Secretary of State" means one of Our Principal Secretaries of State.
 Words in the singular include the plural, and words in the plural include the singular.
- 8 This Order may be cited as the Straits Settlements (Coinage) Order, 1895.
- 9. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, or any earlier day on which it is proclaimed in the Colony by the Governor, and that day is in this Order referred to as the commencement of the Order.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS.

The Lights in the Settlements are twelve in number, *viz.* :—

The *Horsburgh Light-house* is built on the Pedra Branca, about 36 miles to the East of Singapore, to mark the eastern end of the Channel out of the Singapore Straits. The light is a revolving one of the first order, showing a flash every 10 seconds, and is visible from a distance of about 20 miles in clear weather. It is elevated 100 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $1^{\circ} 20'$ North, Longitude $104^{\circ} 24' 30''$ East.

The tower, formerly painted white, is now belted with alternate black and white bands at equal distances apart.

On the 12th October, 1903, the fixed gas light on Fort Canning, known as the *Harbour Light*, was altered to a dioptric occulting light of the first order, with one eclipse every 20 seconds, visible 17 seconds, eclipse 3 seconds, showing red from North 13° West to North 28° West over the dangers near Peak Island; white from North 28° West through West to South 84° West; red from South 84° West to South 74° West and obscure elsewhere; elevation 202 feet above H. W. with a range of 18 miles, exhibiting from a White Steel Light-House.

Raffles Light-house is placed on Coney Island, about 13 miles to the South-West of Singapore, to mark the Outer and South Channel round St. John's Island in Singapore Roads. It shows a bright fixed white light of the third order, visible from a distance of 12 miles. It is elevated 106 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $1^{\circ} 9'$ North, Longitude $103^{\circ} 44' 30''$ East.

Pulau Pisang Light-house is situated on the highest part of that Island in Latitude $1^{\circ} 27' 30''$ North, and Longitude $103^{\circ} 15'$ East. It is a first order revolving light, flashing every 5 seconds, showing all round the horizon. The light is elevated 325 feet above the sea-level, and should be visible from the deck of a vessel 30 miles.

The structure is a circular tower 40 feet in height, of a red brick colour. The balcony and lantern are white, the quarters and out-buildings a grey colour.

Pulau Undan Light-house is situated on the summit of that Island, which is 100 feet high. The light is an intermittent flash light of the third order, showing intervals of ten and twenty seconds, and is visible in clear weather from a distance of 20 miles. It is elevated 155 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $2^{\circ} 3'$ North, Longitude $102^{\circ} 20' 30''$ East.

Malacca Light is a harbour light. It is a fixed light of the fourth order, visible from a distance of 13 miles. It is elevated 180 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $2^{\circ} 11' 20''$ North, Longitude $102^{\circ} 15' 30''$ East.

Cape Rachado Light-house is placed on a high bluff of land, 30 miles to the North of Malacca. Its object is to light up the narrow part of the Straits in the neighbourhood of the Pyramid and Bambeck Shoals. The light is a fixed light of the second order, visible from a distance of 26 miles. It is elevated 446 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $2^{\circ} 25'$ North, Longitude $101^{\circ} 51'$ East.

The *Screw Pile Light-house* is screwed down on the North Sands, Straits of Malacca, in 18 feet of water, and is situated about half-a-mile South by East of where the Light-vessel was moored. The tower is painted red and slate colour. The light is a revolving light of the third order, with intervals of one minute, and visible all round from the deck of a vessel 15 miles. It is elevated 55 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $2^{\circ} 52' 50''$ North, Longitude $100^{\circ} 58' 40''$ East.

Pulau Rimau Light is a fixed red light of the fourth order, exhibited from a light-house, painted white, erected at the South-East point of Pulau Rimau. It is elevated 130 feet above high water, and is visible from a distance of 12 miles. The red sector shows over an arc of 199° from North 53° East to South 34° West. Latitude $5^{\circ} 14' 15''$ North, Longitude $100^{\circ} 16'$ East.

Penang Harbour Light is shown from a flag-staff erected about 60 feet West of the old light-house on Fort Point, George Town, Penang. It is a revolving white light, and revolves once in every thirty seconds. It is a dioptric light of the fourth order, elevated 107 feet above high water, and visible from a distance of 15 miles. Latitude $5^{\circ} 24' 45''$ North, Longitude $100^{\circ} 20' 10''$ East.

The *Muka Head Light*, situated at the northern end of Penang Island, is a first order revolving light flashing every twenty seconds. It is elevated 795 feet above the level of the sea, and is visible in clear weather from a distance of about 30 miles. It is placed on a summit of a hill, which is 750 feet high. Latitude $5^{\circ} 27' 40''$ North, Longitude $100^{\circ} 10' 30''$ East. It is connected by telephone with George Town and the Hill Station.

The *Sultan Shoal Light-house* is built on the Sultan Shoal, in Latitude $1^{\circ} 14' 30''$ North, and Longitude $103^{\circ} 39' 25''$ East. It is a revolving catoptric light 60 feet above high-water mark shewing a bright flash every 30 seconds, visible all round with a range of 13 miles.

The structure consists of a tower surrounded by the keeper's dwelling-house, two stories in height, and reaching to within 18 feet of the lantern.



At Singapore, the Hospitals are supplied by a service from the water-works. At the Quarantine Station St. John's from wells supplemented by water boats from Singapore.

At the Dindings, from a well in the Hospital Compound.

At Penang, the water is conveyed in iron pipes from the hill; at Balik Pulau, water is conveyed in pipes from the hills.

At Pulau Jerejak, rain water is collected and conducted by pipes. Water is also pumped from a well into tanks.

At Province Wellesley, from wells and hill streams.

At Butterworth and Bukit Mertajam, by pipes from reservoir.

At Malacca, from the new water-works and also from wells; at Alor Gajah and Jasin, from wells.

What is the quality of the water?

Good at all the Stations.

(II) Detail the arrangements as to Baths and Lavatories.

All the Hospitals are provided with bath-rooms furnished with bath-tubs and tanks. In Tan Tock Seng's Hospital, Singapore, the patients bathe in enclosed bathing-houses, with cisterns to hold water from pipes.

At the Quarantine Station St. John's, the people bathe in the sea.

At the Dindings, the patients bathe in the open air at a well close to the Hospital.

At Malacca, the Native patients bathe at enclosed wells.

(III) What is the system of Sewerage, and what is the condition of the Privies?

At all the Stations, the night-soil is removed twice a day. The privies are in good condition except at the Quarantine Station St. John's.




