LAND REVENUE.

SINGAPORE.

:oo:

Land in the hands of private owners in Singapore is held direct from the Crown, either by lease or grant. The terms of the leases vary; a great portion of the land on which the town stands is held on building-leases for 60 and 99 years.

The terms of the leases in the country are, for the most part, 99 and 999 years, but certain gambier and pepper plantations are held on leases for ten years. Statutory grants, however, are now alone being issued since the passing of Ordinance II of 1886.

The area held under permits issued formerly in anticipation of survey is being gradually reduced, the permits being called in and leases issued. About 100 acres are still held under permit.

The quit-rent reserved in leases for lands in the country issued before October 15th, 1883, is 30 cents per acre; the quit-rent on lands leased subsequent to that date varies according to the advantages of the land as to situation, soil, &c., but is in no case less than 40 cents per acre. In all leases issued since the 15th October, 1883, a condition under which the quit-rent is re-adjustable every thirty years is inserted. Since the passing of "The Crown Lands Ordinance 1886," the only instrument of title is a statutory grant in perpetuity subject to a minimum quit-rent of 50 cents per acre re-adjustable every thirty years.

The extent of land alienated in fee simple before 1871, which pays no revenue to the Crown, is considerable, and accounts for the comparative lowness of the permanent annual Land Revenue.

The Rent-roll of the Settlement shews an annual permanent revenue of \$34,368. The collections in 1888 amounted to \$39,356.10, but this includes arrears due in previous years as well as payments on account of new land taken up during the year. Rent of temporary occupation permits is also included under the head of "Collections."

There were three sales of country lands during the year.

The Registration of Deeds Office is now a separate office and the fees are collected in stamps. The amount of fees collected in 1888 was \$14,386.25.

PENANG.

Land in Penang and Province Wellesley is held of the Crown, as in Singapore, by grant or lease. The conditions of tenure vary according to the policy of the Government at the time the documents were issued respectively. (In Singapore eighteen, in Penang twenty different kinds of title are in the hands of the public.)

The rates of rent reserved in old leases vary in different districts.

Unoccupied Crown land is obtainable on statutory grants in perpetuity, premium and quit-rent being fixed according to the advantages of locality, soil, &c.

The area in possession of permit-holders in anticipation of survey is very considerable, especially in Province Wellesley.

The tenure of land in the town of Malacca has remained unchanged since the days of Dutch rule. Possession is evidenced in many cases by documents of title in Dutch. Occupied land in the country is, for the most part, held either under grant or lease from the Crown, or by the native customary tenure without written evidence of title.

Land is now obtainable on terms similar to those in force in Singapore and Penang.

The principal land-revenue consists of rents on Crown leases and of the money payments made in lieu of a tithe in kind of the produce of land held under the native customary tenure. For these tithes, an assessment, subject to revision at intervals, is about to be substituted.

RENTS, EXCLUSIVE OF LAND.

Under this head are included the sums received for letting out certain Government Bungalows, and Public Buildings, and the rent paid for the regular hire of certain houses belonging to Government.

LICENSES.

Authorised by "Excise Ordinances," Nos. IV of 1870, and VI of 1879.

Opium and Spirits.—The exclusive privilege of retailing Opium, and of preparing Chandu and Opium Dross, and of retailing Spirits, is farmed out for a term of three years.

The two farms are let for \$2,292,600, from 1st January, 1886.

Pawnbrokers.—The privilege to license Pawnshops is regulated by Ordinance VII of 1872. This Ordinance requires a Pawnbroker to take a license, paying a fee, to be fixed by Government from time to time, and under certain rules. The privilege is farmed out, and produces a revenue of \$148,800.

Under Ordinance No. VIII of 1868,

the following rules are observed with reference to *Gunpowder* licenses, for which a fee of \$5 each is charged:—

Any person removing Gunpowder without a permit, or contrary to the terms of such permit, shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, and the Gunpowder shall be seized and forfeited.

Any person removing Gunpowder from a Gunpowder Hulk or Magazine to any vessel or place on shore, shall do so in properly covered boats, which shall be provided with sufficient tarpaulins; and before removing Gunpowder in barrels from a boat to any place on shore, the barrels shall be covered with tarpaulins.

1.—Every licensed dealer in Gunpowder shall provide a Magazine, to be approved of by the Licensing Officer, wherein Gunpowder shall be kept, and shall keep the Magazine in such a place in his Store or Shop as shall be approved of by the Licensing Officer.

2.—No licensed dealer shall receive or deliver, or take out from the Magazine at his Store or Shop, any Gunpowder before 6 A.M. or after 6 P.M.

3.—Every license to keep Gunpowder for sale under fifty pounds weight shall have endorsed on it a copy of these rules and a copy of section 6 of "The Gunpowder Ordinance 1868."

4.—No licensed dealer in Gunpowder shall deliver any quantity of Gunpowder, exceeding 5lb in weight, to any person, until such person shall have produced to him a Permit, under section 15 of the said Ordinance, for the removal of such Gunpowder.

Section 6 of Ordinance No. VIII of 1868.

The Governor in Council may, from time to time, make such rules as may seem to be required for the management and safety of Stores and Shops licensed under this Ordinance for the retail sale of Gunpowder, and for the breach of any such Rules a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars may, on conviction, be levied against the licensed owners of such Stores or Shops, and their Sureties, and the license of any person so convicted may be cancelled.

Licenses under Indian Act No. III of 1863, and Ordinances Nos. IV of 1870 and VI of 1879.

A tax of \$1 each is charged by the Police on all licenses for Coffee-shops, Eating-houses, and Lodging-houses. Other charges are levied for the following classes of houses, but they are paid to the respective Farmers:—

a fee of \$20 is charged for each License for storage of Petroleum beyond the limits of the Towns as defined from time to time under "The Hackney Carriages Ordinance 1879."

STAMPS.

The total Stamp Revenue for 1888 was \$355,057.39, including \$68,214.38 derived from Judicial Stamps.

Under "The Stamp Ordinance 1881," Impressed stamps have been re-introduced for stamping all but a few documents. The following rates are fixed by "The Stamp Ordinance 1885," viz.:—





MENT OF REVENUE, 1887, AND REVENUE, 1888.

CAUSE OF INCREASE OR DECREASE.

- a. *Decrease* :—Singapore, \$104,805.84. *Increases* :—Penang, \$3,619.71; Malacca, \$11,464.92. Almost the whole of the decrease in Singapore is accounted for by the extraordinary receipts in 1887 on sales of Town lands at Pearl's Hill and Upper Cross Street. The increase in Penang is due mainly to District Administration; and in Malacca to the settlement of long-standing claims for lands sold, the issue of grants having previously been partially suspended, pending the settlement of terms under the new land scheme.
- b. The increase is due to the sale of some town lots.
- c. There were no sales of the Teluk Ayer Reclamation land held during 1888.
- d. *Increases* :—Singapore, \$1,742.30; Penang, \$3,352.68; Malacca, \$30,607.28. These increases are due partly to the collection of arrears, and partly to increased holdings. At Malacca two years' rent was in numerous cases demanded, so as to clear the account to the end of 1888.
- e. *Increase* :—Singapore, \$550. *Decrease* :—Penang, \$23.78. Higher rents obtained in Singapore.
- f. *Increases* :—Singapore, \$197.01; Penang, \$1,183.50. The increase in Penang is due chiefly to a portion of the rent for 1887 of the ground occupied by Stalls near the Jetty having been paid in advance in the previous year.
- g. *Decreases* :—Singapore, \$777.51; Penang, \$325.18. *Increase* :—Malacca, \$18.83. The decrease in Singapore is partly due to the cessation of demand for coral by the Tanjong Pagar Land Company for their reclamation works.
- h. This is a Malacca item, and fluctuates with the amount of the crop. Tenthths are also gradually being superseded by assessment.
- i. This item of revenue in 1887 included Royalty on Jungle Produce, the receipts for which in 1888 are credited under the head of Miscellaneous: *see note m.* There was also a decrease in the Royalty on Timber proper, from fall in prices.
- j. *Increases* :—Singapore, \$12; Penang, \$307.80; Malacca, \$210.80.
- k. *Decreases* :—Singapore, \$9,377; Penang, \$619. *Increase* :—Malacca, \$634. The large decrease in Singapore is due to the Fees for Registration of Deeds and Bills of Sale being entirely paid in Stamps during the year 1888, under Ordinance XIII of 1886: *see note r.* (Stamps).
- l. *Decreases* :—Singapore, \$417; Penang, \$613; Malacca, \$267. Fewer Statutory Grants issued.
- m. This consists chiefly of Royalty on Jungle Produce: *see note i.*
- n. *Increases* :—Singapore, \$1,077.40; Penang, \$2,671.24. *Decrease* :—Malacca, \$2,413.13.
- o. *Decreases* :—Singapore, \$4,722.24; Penang, \$3,319.20; Malacca, \$794.15.
- p. The decrease is in Penang, \$2,477.50, due to the smaller number of contracts, owing to direct immigration to Sumatra, and to official interference in China with emigration to the Straits. An increase of \$1,601.25 in Singapore.
- q. A new item of revenue, which came into force in Singapore about the beginning of 1888, under Ordinance No. XXIII of 1886, subsequently repealed.
- r. The receipts in 1887 under this head represented the revenue for six months; those in 1888 are for a whole year.

CAUSE OF INCREASE OR DECREASE.

- a. Notwithstanding reduced rates on certain classes of vessels from 1st September, 1888, there were increases in all three Settlements, from the expansion in the shipping trade.
- b. *Increases* :—Singapore, \$487.34; Penang, \$256.01. *Decrease* :—Malacca, \$0.50.
- c. Decrease in Singapore, \$53; increase in Penang, \$1,588, due to the number of small passenger boats at that port and more frequent surveys of them.
- d. *Increases* :—Singapore, \$92.50; Penang, \$476.50; Malacca, \$43.80.
- e. *Increases* :—Singapore, \$6,627.02; Malacca, \$376.95. *Decrease* :—Penang, \$357.35. In addition to the continued increase of correspondence from the Colony, there is an increasing demand for Stamps for the Native States, and these were nearly all supplied from Singapore in 1888, while previously Pétrak had obtained Stamps from Penang. Commission on Money Orders was also paid in Singapore by affixing Postage Stamps, instead of in cash as formerly.
- f. *Decreases* :—Singapore, \$1,300.37; Penang, \$754.57. *Increase* :—Malacca, \$116. The revenue returns of the Chinese Sub-Post Office in Singapore shew a falling-off in rece.pts amounting to \$1,821.06.
- g. Arrears due by the Spanish Government in 1887 were settled in 1888.
- h. *Decreases* :—Singapore, \$1,138.05; Penang, \$181.22. *Increase* :—Malacca, \$54.33. The decrease in Singapore is due chiefly to the Commission on Money Orders, which had hitherto been collected in cash, having during 1888 been paid by stamps.
- i. *Decrease* :—Singapore, \$1,345.88. *Increases* :—Penang, \$12,034.17; Malacca, \$1,027.17. The large increase in Penang may perhaps be attributed in some measure to the rigorous prosecution of gamblers, and to the numerous District Courts.
- j. These fees are now paid to the Municipal Fund.
- k. Gradual decrease in the number of surviving Transmarine Convicts.
- l. The decrease is mainly in Singapore.
- m. Increase in all three Settlements, from the larger number of paying patients.
- n. This is collected solely in Malacca, from the Chinese planters, and some difficulty and delay occurred in arranging with them as to the rate of subscription in 1888.
- o. The State of Pétrak has arranged to contribute the salary of this Warden, who was transferred to that State, but is retained on the Colonial Establishment to maintain his right to pension from the Imperial Government.

CAUSE OF INCREASE OR DECREASE.

- a. This is not a fixed Grant ; the receipts vary yearly. After deducting from the interest on the funds now held by the Supreme Court such sums as are payable for the maintenance of the indigent members of the family, the balance becomes available as a contribution to the Malay Home at Penang.
- b. There was a large increase in Malacca, but a larger decrease in Penang.
- c. In previous years this item includes Sale of Books, the stock of which having been sold to a private firm in 1887 causes the decrease.
- d. Less business under the Crown Suits Ordinance in 1888 than in 1887.
- e. There was no printing done at the Government Printing Office for the Native States in 1888.
- f. This receipt represents two years' contributions, for 1887 and 1888, at \$300 per annum.
- g. The pension of the ex-Pěnghúlu of Rěmbau, HAJI SAIL, was at \$200 per mensem, and payments amounting to \$12,834.52 were made during the years 1883 to 1887. The State reimbursed \$60 monthly from the 18th March, 1884, to the end of 1887 ; the difference has now been charged to the Negri Sembilan.
- h. This was a special receipt in 1887.
- i. *Decreases :—* In 1887 a large quantity of condemned stores of the Public Works Department were sold ; there was also a sale of iron railings to Sélángor.
- j. Decrease in Cash Balances, from various investments.
- k. Increase in the Reserve Fund invested in the Indian Loan.
- l. The decrease is chiefly from the extinction of the Sélángor Railway Loan.
- m. This is the first interest charged on the Negri Sembilan Loans.
- n. All arrears of interest due by the Municipalities were settled up in 1887, while in 1888 only current interest was paid.
- o. The amount in 1887 represents the profit on Coin of the nominal value of \$207,000 ; that in 1888 of the value of \$244,000 ; yet the profit is smaller, owing to the lower rates of exchange.
- p. The amount in 1887 represents the profit on Coin of the nominal value of \$70,000 ; that in 1888 of the value of \$95,000 ; but larger amounts have been allowed to the Protected Native States than before, at a rebate of 20%.
- q. This consists chiefly of Native States payments to cover interest on payments on their account by the Crown Agents. The increase is due to larger business done by them.
- r. } These are merely adjustments which seem to call for no special explanation.
- s. } This is the first receipt of interest on the Reserve Fund invested in Gold in England.
- t. This is the profit on the transfer of Government of India Loan Notes amounting to Rs1,122,000 into Gold Stocks.

CAUSE OF INCREASE OR DECREASE.

- a. Speaking generally, the decrease might be shortly accounted for by the fact that in 1887 thirteen months' Salaries were paid. There are some Departments, however, that show much larger decreases than would be so caused—notably the Public Works Department, the large decrease in which is due to the greater part of the Survey Department being otherwise provided for. Among the increases may be specially noted those in the various District Offices (partly counterbalanced by savings in the Magistrates' Departments), and the Agent of the Governor at Pahang.
- b. This decrease is partly attributable to the payment of thirteen months' Allowances in 1887, and partly to the lapsing of the Personal Allowances to Governor Sir F. A. WELD and Dr. DENNYS.
- c. The principal decreases are in District Offices, Chinese Protectorate, and Revenue and Trigonometrical Surveys.

CAUSE OF INCREASE OR DECREASE.

- a. Superannuation Allowances :—*Decrease*:—Singapore, \$2,016.50. *Increases*:—Penang, \$3,575.64; Malacca, \$1,025.80. Annuities to Landed Proprietors shows an increase of \$6,720.95 in consequence of the Annuities which had to be paid for the Land of Tithe Impropriators newly taken over.
- b. *Principal Decreases*:—Expenses of Registrar's Office (provided for under Establishments in 1888), \$2,851.09; Pay of Chain-bearers (in 1888 paid chiefly from the vote for Surveys pending arrival of Survey Party from India), \$7,542.46; Expenses connected with visit of an Officer from India to advise about Straits Survey, \$3,534.24; Revenue Survey (head not appearing in 1888), \$12,438.22. *Principal Increases*:—Collection of Rates and Taxes in Country Districts (principally in Penang, and partly charged to the Municipality), \$9,839.04; Purchase of Stamps and Presses, \$2,642.98.
- c. This is the net decrease on a large number of items, none of which calls for special notice.
- d. *Principal Decreases*:—Relief of Distressed Masters, Mates, and Engineers, \$925.10; Relief of Widows and Children of the late Master and Engineer of the S. S. *Bentan*, \$500. On the other hand, the annual grant of \$1,000 to the Po LEUNG KUK Society appears first in 1888.
- e. *Principal Decreases*:—Vernacular Boys' Schools, \$8,362.99; Vernacular Girls' Schools, \$937.54; Building Grant Tamil Mission School, \$1,500; Purchase of Books, \$1,505.44. *Principal Increases*:—Higher Scholarships, \$1,182.44; Monthly Bonuses to Teachers of Vernacular Schools (in substitution for Capitation Grants), \$3,161.72; Grants for Results, \$1,339.50; Special Grant to Penang Free School, \$1,200; Building Grant Raffles Girls' School Extension, \$1,250. The decrease in the expenditure under the head of Vernacular Schools is largely owing to the discontinuance of Capitation Grants, formerly paid from these votes.
- f. *Principal Decreases*:—On the Lock Hospitals of the three Settlements, as a result of the repeal of the C.D.O., \$5,501.24; Expenses in connection with outbreak of Small-pox in Penang and Province Wellesley, \$2,013.29. *Principal Increases*:—Clothing and Miscellaneous Articles from England, \$5,070.29 (this being a new vote, and the local expenditure under these heads being much less than in the previous year); Pauper Hospitals, Diets for Patients, Penang \$854.64, Malacca \$1,906.96, from increased numbers.
- g. *Principal Decreases*:—Conveyance of Witnesses and Prisoners, Penang, \$796.28; Secret Service, Singapore and Penang, \$1,048.35; Expenses of Hackney Carriage Department (transferred to the Municipality), \$3,569.35; Miscellaneous Expenses for the whole Force, \$1,541.50. *Principal Increases*:—Clothing and Accoutrements for the whole Force, \$3,637.42; Suppression of Gambling (new service), \$2,773.11.
- h. *Principal Decreases*:—Rations for Warders and Prisoners, Singapore \$4,113.53, Penang \$1,049.70, partly from reduced contract rates, but chiefly from diminished numbers. *Principal Increase*:—Police Guards, Singapore, \$1,546.80, additional sentries having been required during the progress of alterations in the buildings, as well as guards to outside working parties.
- i. The increase is chiefly in repairs to the Steam Launch and purchase of a new Buoy.
- j. The principal saving is in Maintenance and Repairs; there is a considerable increase in Rations and Clothing.
- k. Decreases under most of the items: principal ones:—Rations and Clothing, \$1,740.69; Oil and Stores, \$1,119.65; New Iron Buoys and Moorings, \$1,999.05; Docking and Repairs of *Formosa* Light-vessel, \$2,500,—the last two items being special ones in 1887.
- l. The increases are in Fuel and Water, Rations and Clothing.
- m. The decrease arises chiefly from the special item in 1887 of \$12,997.03 for a new Steam Launch for Malacea, against \$3,000 in 1888 for a Steam Cutter for Penang. There was an increase of \$2,609.89 for Docking and Repairs, chiefly in Singapore.
- n. *Principal Decreases*:—Contribution to Imperial Post Office, \$1,896.66; Foreign Postage, \$4,954.56,—from irregularity in dates of settlement.
- o. Principal decreases are in Rent of the Raffles Library and Museum (which ceased on the opening of the new building) and Rent of Quarters for Police.
- p. There was a decrease in the Land Office Transport, more than counterbalanced by the Transport of the new District Offices. Other principal decreases were—Public Works and Survey Department, \$3,785.57. *Principal Increase*:—Passage of Officers to and from the Colony, \$3,215.01.
- q. This increase is due to the losses in exchange owing to the fall in rates during the year.
- r. *Principal Increases*:—Surveys pending arrival of Survey Party from India, \$61,649.40; Subsidy for Immigrant Steamers, \$4,166.62; Government Agency at Pahang, \$4,832.99; Stationery for all Departments, \$2,746.04; Grants to Singapore Volunteer Artillery, \$7,136.89; Special Grant to Tunku ALLUM, \$10,000; Property of the Singapore and Penang Municipalities taken over by Government, \$15,000. *Principal Decreases*:—New Type, &c. &c., for Printing Office, \$3,408.05; Compensation to Dindings Pēnghūlus, \$8,500; Expenditure of Pulau Pangkor for part of 1886, \$7,391.28; Demarcation of Boundaries at the Dindings, \$2,318.15; Trigonometrical Survey, \$5,819.67; Maintenance of Forest Reserves, \$5,975.99; Office and Quarters for Assistant Superintendent of Forests, \$4,172.25; Contributions towards Protection against Fire, \$9,612.52; Reprint of Ordinances, \$5,607.07; Statue of Sir STAMFORD RAFFLES, \$11,415.10.

The increases in Singapore and Penang are mainly due to the taking over by the Government from the Municipalities of the roads outside of town limits. In Malacca various improvements in roads were undertaken.
- u. *Increase in Compensation for Land at Blakang Mati taken for Military purposes*, \$11,661.25 ; but most of the other items against which expenditure was incurred in 1887 do not appear in 1888.
- v. *Increase in Military Rent Allowances*, from the larger number of Officers stationed here.
- w. The difference is caused almost entirely by the cessation of the Allowance to the ex-Pēnghílu of Rémbau, on the one hand, and the addition, on the other, of the Salary of W. RAWLINS, now Gaoler in Pérak, formerly Warder in the Colonial Service, whose name is retained on our books to save his claim to Pension from the Imperial Government, the amount, however, being paid by Pérak.
- x. Principal item in 1887—Celebration of the Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen, \$11,997.49 ; in 1888—Contribution towards the Imperial Institute, \$33,103.45. For the latter object \$30,000 was borne on the Estimates 1887, but not then appropriated, as the equivalent of £5,000 ; the increase in the amount is due to the fall in exchange. Refund of Revenue shows an increase of \$26,331.25, mainly owing to the collection of Assessments at Penang as revenue, a share of which had to be paid over to the Municipality.

CAUSE OF EXCESS OR DEFICIENCY.

- a. *Under-estimates* in all three Settlements:—Singapore, \$11,388.53; Penang, \$8,917; Malacca, \$13,822.85. The excess in Singapore is accounted for by the issue of grants disposed of by private treaty on renewals, &c., and by large sales of country lands; in Penang by larger sales of Crown Land than had been anticipated. In Malacca a large number of titles were completed which had been delayed in previous years from various causes.
- b. It was not considered advisable to press further sales of town lots at the Dindings.
- c. There were no sales of the Teluk Ayer Reclamation lands held during the year.
- d. *Under-estimates* in all three Settlements:—Singapore, \$1,856.10; Penang, \$6,615.33; Malacca, \$40,981.62. The excesses are due to increased holdings and collection of arrears. In Malacca the estimate was much below the actual receipts in recent years, and in addition to the collection of arrears and back rents, rents were demanded in advance for 1888.
- e. Singapore shows an excess of \$660, from the Havelock Road Canal Frontage having been let at an enhanced rent. Penang, receipts \$155.20, not estimated.
- f. *Under-estimate* :—Penang, \$1,254.25. *Over-estimate* :—Singapore, \$119.99. Unanticipated rents received at Penang.
- g. } The estimates were excessive as compared with the receipts of previous years. The padi crop, too, was rather short.
- i. The deficiency is largely attributed to a fall in the price of tampinis timber limiting the export.
- j. *Under-estimates* :—Singapore, \$612; Penang, \$1,531; Malacca, \$333.80.
- k. *Under-estimates* :—Singapore, \$55; Penang, \$1,216.50; Malacca, \$774.
- l. The excess is chiefly in Penang, due to the larger number of permits issued to Contractors to remove sand and red earth for building operations on the reclaimed land.
- m. This consists chiefly of Royalty on jungle produce, which realized more than was expected.
- n. *Over-estimates* :—Singapore, \$5,599.12; Penang, \$23,801.49; Malacca, \$2,669.53.
- o. *Over-estimates* :—Singapore, \$10,327.77; Penang, \$10,738.15; Malacca, \$719.70.
- p. Excess, Singapore, \$965; Deficiency, Penang, \$4,195.25, due to a falling-off in the number of contracts entered into in the Settlement, arising from direct emigration to Sumatra, and, in a greater degree, from action on the part of the Chinese Officials at Swatow with regard to the coolie traffic.
- q. Estimated for under Fees of Office at \$900.
- r. Principally due to the number of Deeds, dated prior to 1st July 1887, presented for registration; for which the fee was raised from \$3 to \$5 from the 1st April 1888.

CAUSE OF EXCESS OR DEFICIENCY.

- a. Not estimated for.
- b. *Over-estimates* :—Singapore, \$328.37; Penang, \$2,858.62. In Malacca there was an excess of \$561.23, due to the issue of many titles the charges for which had been deposited in suspense.
- c. *Under-estimates* :—Singapore, \$277.71; Penang, \$527.99; Malacca, \$486.27.
- d. The amount on the Estimates is the equivalent of the fixed allowances granted to the Attorney-General and Solicitor-General in lieu of fees on Crown Suits, based on the average receipts for three years, in consideration of such fees being paid in as revenue. The Crown suits during the year 1888, however, appear to have been few and unimportant.
- e. The Native States made other arrangements for their printing.
- f. This is the total amount of the allowance to HAJI SAIL, late Penghulu of Rembau, after deducting reimbursements by that State, now transferred to the loan account with the Negri Sembilan.
- g. *Under-estimates* :—Singapore, \$1,059.99; Penang, \$4,039.26; Malacca, \$574.32. In Singapore the excess is in charges made for cost of defining boundaries; in Penang, from sale of Hackney Carriage plates to the Municipality, from store-rents of the Gunpowder Magazine, and from Telegraph receipts; in Malacca, also from receipts from the new overland Telegraph.
- h. The balances were maintained at a higher level than had been estimated for.
- i. The deficiency is due to the November interest not appearing in our accounts in 1888. It is shown in the Statement of Revenue in Arrears following the Assets and Liabilities.
- j. This is also due to arrears.
- k. The amount of Coin received and put in circulation was much larger than was anticipated.
- l. This consists mainly of a small percentage paid by the Native States upon expenditure on their account by the Crown Agents, to cover interest. There was a large increase in the business so done.
- m. This is an adjustment on the fluctuations in exchange, and cannot be accurately foreseen.
- n. This, again, is dependent on the course of exchange, which during most of the year ruled higher than the official rates which, as a measure of safety, it was thought prudent to fix.
- o. This is the first interest on our investments at home.
- p. And this the gain on the transfer from silver to gold stocks. This transaction had not been decided on when the Estimates were framed.
- q. There being still points in dispute with the grantees, a considerable part of the contributions remained uncollected.
- r. *Under-estimates* :—Singapore, \$930.33; Penang, \$472.97; Malacca, \$435.79.
- s. Increase in value of the Shell Farm.
- t. Amount of expenditure on account of the Negri Sembilan in 1883-4, now written off to loan account.

 - b. *Excesses* :— Penang, \$42,598.02; Malacca, \$3,403.24. *Over-estimate* :— Singapore, \$7,618.84. In Singapore there was much delay in procuring Assessment Rolls from the Municipality, and those eventually supplied proved much less in amount than had been roughly estimated. It is to be noted that of the amount received in Penang, \$77,598, \$28,519.36 was collected on account of the Municipality, and has been paid over to the Commissioners. In Malacca, the taxes on country carts and carriages appear to have been omitted from the estimate. Of the total amount collected by way of assessment, \$426 was refunded in relief of small holders, and appears as Refund of Revenue under the head Special Expenses.

On the other hand, an allowance of \$800 was granted to the Senior Puisne Judge at Penang, which was not provided for in the Estimates.
- c. The Expenditure in certain Departments was in excess of the Estimates to the amount of \$684.74, while in other Departments it fell short of the Estimates to the amount of \$3,076.47.

CAUSE OF EXCESS OR SAVING.

- a. This is due to the taking over of lands of Tithe Impropriators at Malacca, the Annuities on which caused an excess of \$6,655.93 under that head. There was also an excess of \$801.98 on the vote for Gratuities to Officers not entitled to Pensions, and to Families of Deceased Officers; but under other heads there were savings.
- b. *PrincipaL Savings* :—Auctioneers' Charges on Land Sales, \$2,442.93 ; Purchase of Boundary Stones (chiefly in Malacca), \$2,926.01 ; Expenses of Work under "The Boundaries Ordinance, 1884" (in Penang and Malacca), \$5,659.87 ; Pay of Chain-bearers, \$889.20. *PrincipaL Excesses* :—Collection of Rates and Taxes in Country Districts (chiefly in Penang, where large collections were made on Municipal account), \$6,839.04 ; Purchase of Stamps and Presses, \$2,455.34.
- c. Savings on most of the votes. The principal excesses were—Allowances to Officers sitting as Magistrates, Singapore and Penang (unprovided for), \$342 ; Coroners' Fees, \$615.
- d. Savings on nearly all the votes: principal ones—Relief of Distressed Women, Chinese and others, \$936.17 ; Relief of Distressed Colonial Sailors, \$601.66 ; Relief of Distressed Masters, Mates, and Engineers, \$1,248.90.
- e. There were savings on nearly all the votes, but the only considerable ones were—Monthly Bonuses to Teachers of Vernacular Schools, \$1,188.28 ; Grants for Results, \$1,233 ; Building Grant to Pulo Tikus School not appropriated, \$1,500. On the other hand, there was a Building Grant of \$1,250 to the Raffles Girls' School, Singapore, not provided for in the Estimates.
- f. The majority of the votes were under-spent, but the net saving is principally due to the effect of the repeal of the C. D. O., consequent upon which the expenditure on the Lock Hospitals of the three Settlements fell below the estimates by \$5,101.47. In the Lunatic Asylum, there were excesses on Diets for Patients, \$701.83 ; Contingent Expenses and Medical Comforts, \$1,072.93 ; Implements for Manufacturing purposes (not provided for), \$447.90 ; while there was a saving of \$1,415 on Raw Materials for Manufacture. In the Malacca Pauper Hospital, the large increase in the number of patients caused an excess expenditure of \$1,800 for Diets.
- g. Savings on most of the votes, the largest amounts being—Allowances to European Police in lieu of Rations (the establishment having been under the strength provided for), \$1,237.05 ; Extra Pay to Detective Police, \$973.34 ; Clothing and Accoutrements, \$4,485.93 ; Conveyance of Witnesses and Prisoners, \$1,172.16 ; Secret Service, Penang, \$1,514. On the other hand, \$2,773.11 was spent by the Department for the Suppression of Gambling in Singapore, which was not provided for.
- h. Large savings in Rations for Warders and Prisoners,—at Singapore, \$5,901.75, from reduced numbers ; at Penang, \$4,241.28, mainly from over-estimate. Excess on the vote for Police Guards, Singapore, \$1,600, large numbers of Police having been necessary as sentries during the progress of certain alterations in the Gaol, and as guards to outside working parties. Savings on most of the other votes.
- i. Savings on most of the votes, principally—Maintenance and Repairs of Boats and Flagstaffs, \$950.13 ; Clearing Rivers and Harbours, \$687.30.
- j. Savings on nearly every vote, principally—Oil and Stores, \$1,195.20.
- k. The special vote of \$1,500 for fitting a lower deck was not expended, the work having been countermanded.
- l. An excess of \$1,297.05 in Docking and Repairs, but savings on nearly all the other votes.
- m. An excess of \$2,358.42 in Docking and Repairs, incurred for repairing the *Albuquerque*, which had been employed in the Defense Works. Savings on nearly all the other votes.
- n. Savings on Contribution to Imperial Post Office, \$2,738.66 ; Foreign Postage, \$7,077.73, chiefly from delay on the part of the French and Italian administrations in claiming their transit charges ; Conveyance of Mails to and from Vessels, mainly in Province Wellesley, \$1,168.40.
- o. *PrincipaL Excess* :—Passage of Officers to and from the Colony, \$3,688.03. *PrincipaL Savings* :—Public Works Department, \$1,603.47 ; Police Courts, \$1,283.57.
- p. The Sinking Fund payments appearing in the list of Personal Accounts produces an apparent saving of \$51,418.77, but excesses on other items, due to the fall in exchange, reduce this to \$13,173.01.
- q. The Indian Government being still unable to provide this Colony with a survey party, the vote of \$129,000 for Re-survey of the Colony by Indian Party was untouched ; but, for the same reason, the vote for Surveys pending arrival of Survey Party from India was exceeded by \$33,694.40. Among other excesses were—Upkeep of Furniture of Government House, \$2,319.49 ; Grant to Singapore Volunteer Artillery (not provided for), \$7,136.89 ; payment for Municipal property taken over in Singapore and Penang under Ordinance No. IX of 1887 Section 53, \$15,000 ; among other savings—Contribution to Penang Jubilee and Centenary Memorial (not claimed), \$5,000 ; Special Grant to TUNKU ALLAM, \$5,000, \$10,000 having proved sufficient for the purpose in view.
- r. *Savings* :—Singapore, \$45,500.81 ; Penang, \$11,547.42. *Excess* :—Malacea, \$6,791.81. In Singapore the net savings on Civil Works amounted to \$48,642.65, the principal short payments being on votes for Teluk Ayer Reclamation, \$25,552.42 ; Improvements to Singapore River, \$35,441.84 ; Rebuilding Rochor Police Station, \$3,009.34 ; Maintenance of Singapore River, \$4,746.47 ; and vote unappropriated—Additions to abutments of Ord Bridge, \$1,500. Among works not provided for were—Quarters for Female Prisoners

Most of these were re-votes. On Military Works there was a net excess of \$3,141.81, the principal excesses being—Colonial Contribution to Defences, \$2,022.05 ; Constructing New R. A. District Office, &c., \$3,486.35, not provided for : the principal saving—Special Repairs to Roofs of Fort Canning Barracks unappropriated, \$2,500. Penang : principal savings—Goods Landing Accommodation at Church Street, \$16,925.45 ; Extension of Supreme Court and Offices, \$9,900 ; Construction of a Hospital for Infectious Diseases, \$5,088.40 : principal excesses—New Landing Jetty, \$6,862.60 (re-vote) ; Resident Councillor's House, \$5,582.22 ; Prevention of Muda Floods, \$4,499.27 ; Extension of Indian Immigration Dépôt (not provided for), \$2,176.57. **Report by the Colonial Engineer and Surveyor-General,
Straits Settlements, on the Government House Furniture.**

COLONIAL ENGINEER'S OFFICE,
Singapore, 24th January, 1889.

IN reference to amended Colonial Regulation No. 283, I have the honour to report
as follows :—

1. Government House with its Out-offices, Stables, &c., has, since its construction, been kept in a state of thorough repair at the expense of the Public, and the only works of which it stands now in need, are the ordinary periodical services, such as white-washing, painting, &c.
2. Furniture, Matting, Plate, Crockery, Glass, &c., have been provided from time to time, in the Colonial Estimates for the purpose. The Furniture requires to be generally overhauled and much of it condemned. In a climate such as that of Singapore, furniture rapidly deteriorates and requires periodical renewal. The time has arrived for extensive repairs and supply of proper furniture.

NOTE.—The Kati of $1\frac{1}{3}$ lbs. Avoirdupois is known as the *Chinese Kati*. There is another weight, known as the *Malay Kati*, which was probably the original Standard, and which is still in partial use at Penang. The weight of the *Malay Kati* is that of 24 Spanish Dollars, or 9,984 grains. This gives 142.628 pounds as the weight of the Pikul, and 5,705.143 pounds as the weight of the Koyan. The Koyan, considered as a measure of capacity, is divided into 800 Gantangs, and it is accordingly found that a Malacca Gantang of Rice weighs with a great degree of accuracy $\frac{5705.143}{800} = 7.133$ pounds. Taking the *Gantang* at the dimensions given to it at Singapore and Penang, no relation can be established between the *Koyan of weight* and the *Koyan of capacity*. Under the Dutch Government at Malacca, the Pikul was reckoned equal to 125 pounds Amsterdam, or 136.1825 pounds Avoirdupois.

L I G H T - H O U S E S.

S T R A I T S S E T T L E M E N T S.

The Lights in the Settlements are eleven in number, viz. :—

The *Horsburgh Light-house* is built on the Pedra Branca, about 36 miles to the East of Singapore, to mark the Eastern end of the Channel out of the Singapore Straits. The light is a revolving one of the first order, showing a flash every 10 seconds and is visible from a distance of about 20 miles in clear weather. It is elevated 100 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $1^{\circ} 20'$ North, Longitude $101^{\circ} 24' 30''$ East.

The tower, formerly painted white, is now belted with alternate black and white bands at equal distances apart.

Singapore Light is a harbour light. It is a fixed light (lit with gas) of the third order, visible from a distance of 18 miles. It is elevated 256 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $1^{\circ} 17'$ North, Longitude $103^{\circ} 51'$ East.

Raffles Light-house is placed on Coney Island, about 13 miles to the South-west of Singapore, to mark the Outer and South Channel round St. John's Island in Singapore Roads. It shows a bright fixed white light of the third order, visible from a distance of 12 miles. It is elevated 106 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $1^{\circ} 9'$ North, Longitude $103^{\circ} 44' 30''$ East.

Pulau Pisang Light-house is situated on the highest part of that Island in Latitude $1^{\circ} 27' 30''$ North, and Longitude $103^{\circ} 15'$ East. It is a first order revolving light, flashing every 5 seconds, shewing all round the horizon. The light is elevated 325 feet above the sea-level, and should be visible from the deck of a vessel 30 miles.

The structure is a circular tower 40 feet in height, of a red brick colour. The balcony and lantern are white, the quarters and out-buildings a grey colour.

Pulau Undan Light-house is situated on the summit of that island, which is 100 feet high. The light is an intermittent flash light of the third order, showing intervals of ten and twenty seconds, and is visible in clear weather from a distance of 20 miles. It is elevated 155 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $2^{\circ} 3'$ North, Longitude $102^{\circ} 20' 30''$ East.

Malacca Light is a harbour light. It is a fixed light of the fourth order, visible from a distance of 13 miles. It is elevated 180 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $2^{\circ} 11' 20''$ North, Longitude $102^{\circ} 15' 30''$ East.

Cape Rachado Light-house is placed on a high bluff of land, 30 miles to the North of Malacca. Its object is to light up the narrow part of the Straits in the neighbourhood of the Pyramid and Bambeck Shoals. The light is a fixed light of the second order, visible from a distance of 26 miles. It is elevated 446 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $2^{\circ} 25'$ North, Longitude $101^{\circ} 51'$ East.

The *Screw Pile Light-house* is screwed down on the North Sands, Straits of Malacca, in 18 feet of water, and is situated about half-a-mile South by East of where the Light-vessel was moored. The tower is painted red and slate colour. The light is a revolving light of the third order, with intervals of one minute, and visible all round from the deck of a vessel 15 miles. It is elevated 55 feet above the level of the sea. Latitude $2^{\circ} 52' 50''$ North, Longitude $100^{\circ} 58' 40''$ East.

Pulau Rimau Light is a fixed red light of the fourth order, exhibited from a light-house, painted white, erected at the South-east point of Pulau Rimau. It is elevated 130 feet above high water, and is visible from a distance of 12 miles. The red sector shows over an arc of 199° from North 53° East to South 34° West. Latitude $5^{\circ} 14' 15''$ North, Longitude $100^{\circ} 16'$ East.

Penang Harbour Light is shown from a flag-staff erected about 60 feet West of the old light-house on Fort Point, George Town, Penang. It is a revolving white light, and revolves once every thirty seconds. It is a dioptric of the fourth order, elevated 107 feet above high water and visible from a distance of 15 miles. Latitude $5^{\circ} 24' 45''$ North, Longitude $100^{\circ} 20' 10''$ East.

The *Muka Head Light*, situated at the Northern end of Penang Island, is a first order revolving light flashing every twenty seconds. It is elevated 795 feet above the level of the sea, and is visible in clear weather from a distance of about 30 miles. It is placed on the summit of a hill, which is 750 feet high. Latitude $5^{\circ} 27' 40''$ North, Longitude $100^{\circ} 10' 30''$ East.

The General Hospital at Singapore and Penang have bath-rooms furnished with bath-tubs. In Tan Tock Seng's Hospital, Singapore, the patients use well water for bathing purposes. Enclosed bathing-houses, with cisterns to hold water from pipes, have been provided and are occasionally used.

At the Prison Hospital, Singapore, there is a small bath-room adjoining it, where hot and cold baths are available.

Bath-rooms are provided at the Lock Hospital.

At the Dindings the patients bathe in the open air at a well close to the Hospital.

At all the Stations the night soil is removed twice a day. The privies are in good condition.

Singapore. (Criminal).—The Prison is on the separate system. As far as possible each prisoner has his own cell, there is now a cell for each prisoner.

Singapore. (Civil).—No separation. Each class of prisoners is kept separate.

Penang. (Criminal).—The separate system is not complete by day, the prisoners working in association. By night it is complete.

Penang. (Civil).—They are in associated wards by night and day.

Malacca. (Criminal).—Partial separation while at work. 32 prisoners sleep in separate cells, and the remainder in association.

Malacca. (Civil).—Partial separation.

Singapore. (Criminal).—On the separate system as far as possible. Supervision by European and Native Officers day and night.

Singapore. (Civil).—Native Warders are placed over the prisoners while in association.

Penang. (Criminal).—The prisoners while working are under European and Native supervision. At night Native Warders are placed over the prisoners, and the wards admit of supervision by Prison Officers. European Warders go their rounds.

Penang. (Civil).—Native Warders are placed so as to have the prisoners under their eye both day and night. European Warders go their rounds.

Malacca. (Criminal).—The prisoners while at work are under European and Native supervision.

Malacca. (Criminal & Civil).—European and Native Warders are over the prisoners while in association, and the wards admit of supervision by Prison Officers, who are relieved so as to keep watch day and night.

Singapore. (Criminal).—954 cells. The sick are in association. There are 50 beds in the Hospital.

Singapore. (Civil).—The Gaol has the following cells:—9 solitary cells, 3 condemned cells, 6 associated cells or wards, 6 debtors' associated sleeping wards, 1 female ward and 4 female separate cells.

Penang. (Criminal).—In cellular ward, 296 cells, and 1 female ward.

Penang. (Civil).—3 solitary cells, 3 condemned cells, 3 association wards, and 1 debtors' ward.

Malacca. (Criminal).—32 separate cells, 2 punishment cells, 4 associated wards, and 1 ward for female prisoners.

Malacca. (Civil).—4 associated wards, 2 condemned cells, and 3 separate cells for lunatics. The Civil Prison is made use of as a temporary asylum for lunatics until an opportunity offers for their transfer to the Lunatic Asylum at Singapore.

Singapore. (Criminal).—Tread-mill, shot-drill and crank.

Penang. (Criminal).—Shot-drill (temporarily discontinued) and crank to lower grade and short sentenced prisoners.

Malacea. (Criminal).—Shot-drill, 2 hours daily to lower grade and short sentenced prisoners. Crank labour for refractory prisoners.

Singapore, Malacea. (Civil).—No penal labour.

VII. If so, during what parts of imprisonment, in respect of what classes of prisoners, and during how many hours is such penal labour enforced? In stating hours of tread-wheel labour, give first, the total time on and off at the wheel, &c.; secondly, the length of spells and intervals of rest.

Singapore. (Criminal).—Long sentenced lower grade prisoners and short sentenced prisoners do tread-wheel and shot-drill. Those medically fit are put to the tread-wheel, Native long sentenced one hour a day, Native short sentenced alone 3 hours a day and Native short sentenced and European,—15 minutes on the wheel, 10 minutes rest. Ascent 54 steps in a minute.

Prisoners passed by the Medical Officer as capable of doing shot-drill, but not tread-wheel, have one hour shot-drill in the morning and one hour in the afternoon.

Crank are at present reserved for the punishment of refractory prisoners—number of revolutions per day 12,500; weight of pressure 14 lbs.

Penang. (Criminal).—All short sentenced prisoners, long sentenced prisoners for the first 6 months of the term of their sentence, and those who are degraded from the upper stages to lower grade for the term of degradation, two hours in the morning and two hours in the afternoon. Cranks are reserved for punishment.

Malacea. (Criminal).—All short sentenced prisoners and lower grade prisoners, one hour in the morning and one hour in the evening.

Singapore. (Criminal).—Prisoners have been employed during the past year in Public Works, in addition to the usual Prison works of tailors, carpenters, blacksmiths, shoemakers, printers and dhobies, &c.

Penang. (Criminal).—Stone-breaking, carpentry, tailoring, masonry, painting, white and colour-washing, clearing and cleaning, and pounding soorkie.

Malacea. (Criminal).—Breaking-stones, pounding coco-nut husk, and duties and fatigues inside the Prison.

Singapore, Malacea. (Civil).—No labour, excepting cleaning the wards, &c., unless prisoners volunteer.

Singapore. (Criminal).—A few prisoners of revenue and non-payment of fines, about 30 of the short sentenced grade, and 100 of the middle grade prisoners have been employed beyond the walls.

Singapore. (Civil).—Never employed beyond the walls.

Singapore. (Criminal).—Revenue grade and non-payment of fine prisoners have been employed in cleaning drains, &c. and the grounds at the General Hospital. The short sentenced grade prisoners have been employed in carting stones and the middle grade prisoners in filling in the swamp in front of the Warders' quarters.

Penang.—A few of the revenue and short sentenced grades were employed in cleaning drains behind the Gaol.

Malacea. (Criminal).—Revenue grade prisoners were employed in removing night soil, and rubbish from the Prison.

XI. What is the annual amount of the prisoners' earnings?

Singapore. (*Criminal*).—\$1,688.94 were realised by sale of manufactures, &c., and paid into the Treasury. Articles worth \$2,867.39 were issued to the Government Departments during the year.

Singapore. (*Civil*).—Prisoners are out of wards at 5.30 a.m., and shut up at 5.30 p.m. All but condemned prisoners sleep in association, according to classification. The corridors are lighted at nights, patrolled by Sub-Warders, and inspected by the European Warder during the night.

Penang. (*Criminal*).—Twelve hours. The corridors are lighted with oil lamps. Prison Officers are on duty throughout the night. One of the European Warders goes round the wards and cells at uncertain hours each night.

Penang. (*Civil*).—Prisoners are out of the wards at 5.30 a.m., and are shut up at 5.30 p.m. All but condemned prisoners sleep in association, according to classification. The dormitories are lighted at nights, patrolled by Native Warders, and inspected by the Gaoler and European Warder on night duty.

NOTE.—The beans (*Native Prisoners' Diets*) should be soaked for several hours in cold water, generally 12 hours will be sufficient, then washed and boiled till they are quite soft, and then smashed up in a mortar to the consistency of a thick pasty mass. The boiling to the proper consistence generally takes 6 hours. This paste should be placed in a tub, and the rice added by degrees, and the two ingredients stirred together till they are thoroughly, evenly, and intimately blended, the beans imparting a bluish tint to the rice. Sometimes the mixture will appear too dry, but a little more of the liquid part of the diets will remove this.
