Most of the data are compiled from series kept by the Department of Statistics and other government departments and statutory bodies. ## 1. CLIMATE AND LAND USE

The Republic of Singapore is situated in the centre of the Malayan Archipelago. This location at the focal point of the trade routes of the region has contributed greatly to the development of Singapore as an entrepot trade and commercial centre of South East Asia. It has also since developed into a modern, industrialised economy and an international centre in finance, transport and communication.

The land area of Singapore is approximately 618 square kilometres, comprising the main island which measures about 42 kilometres from east to west and 23 kilometres from north to south and a number of islets scattered off the north-east and south of the main island.

Singapore can be geographically divided into three major areas - the central hilly area with heavy deposits of granite in Bukit Timah,

Bukit Panjang, Bukit Mandai and Bukit Batok; and the western undulating area comprising Mount Faber Ridge and Pasir Panjang Ridge with Kranji River flowing into the Johore Straits and Jurong River into the Singapore Straits; and the eastern coastal area consisting of fertile alluvium and sediment stretches from Katong to Bedok and Changi.

#### Climate

The average maximum temperature is around 31°C and the minimum 24°C. The average humidity is around 85 per cent and the general pattern all the year round is that of relatively hot days followed by cool nights. The island generally has rainfall throughout the year but is particularly wet during the Northeast Monsoon season from November to January.

#### Land Use

Of the total land area, about 45 per cent has been developed for residential, commercial and industrial usage and another 13 per cent used for agriculture. The balance which account for 42 per cent of the total land area consists of cultivable waste, forest reserves, marsh and other non-built up areas.

#### Air Pollution

The Anti-Pollution Unit monitored the quality of ambient air in 1980 through 14 stations located in urban, industrial and rural areas. Total acidity, smoke, dust fallout

and oxides of nitrogen are some of the pollutants commonly monitored. Results show that air pollution levels in Singapore are within acceptable air quality standards. Air pollution levels tend to be higher in the urban and industrial areas than in the rural areas. Meteorological conditions also affect air pollution levels significantly. Generally, air pollution levels are lower during the rainy periods of the year (North East Monsoon) when pollutants in the air are washed out by the rain, and they increase during the inter-monsoon periods (April-May, October-November), as the low winds and calm air then do not favour the dispersion of air pollutants.

#### 2. DEMOGRAPHY

## Population Census

Singapore conducted its first population census in 1871 and subsequent censuses at ten-year intervals till the outbreak of World War II. In the pre-war censuses, Singapore was included as part of the Straits Settlements and later of Malaya. Separate censuses for Singapore were carried out in 1947, 1957, 1970 and 1980.

The latest population census was carried out in June 1980. During this census, a total of 2,413.9 thousand persons were enumerated compared with 2,074.5 thousand persons in 1970. Population density per square kilometre rose from 3,538 persons in 1970 to 3,907 persons in 1980.

The census data generally referred to all persons enumerated in Singapore at the time of the census including persons in fishing kelongs, on board ships and boats. They excluded non-locally domiciled services personnel and their families, ships' crew and passengers in transit in Singapore waters and foreign visitors in hotels.

## Mid-year Estimates

The mid-year population estimates for the intercensal years 1971-1979, which were based on the 1970 census data, and estimates of natural increase were revised to include migration deduced from the 1980 census data.

## Births and Deaths

Under the Registration of Births and Deaths Act, a birth must be registered within 42 days and a death within 3 days of occurrence.

Registration facilities for births are available at the Registry of Births and Deaths, gazetted maternal and child health clinics and all government maternity hospitals. Deaths are registered at the Registry of Births and Deaths, government and military hospitals and certain police stations. The registration system is comprehensive and the records of vital statistics are virtually complete.

There has been a marked decline in the crude birth rate, from 22.1 per thousand population in 1970 to 17.1 per thousand in 1980. The crude death rate, on the other hand, has remained stable; between 5.0 and 5.5 per thousand during the same period.

## Fertility Rates

The age-specific fertility rate refers to the number of births attributable to mothers of a specific age group per one thousand females in that age group. The rates for all the age groups declined during the period 1970-1980. The steepest declines occurred in age groups 25-29 and 20-24 years where the age specific fertility rate fell from 208.8 and 139.0 in 1970 to 137.3 and 79.9 respectively in 1980. The two extreme age groups, namely the 15-19 years and 45-49 years showed the least declines as their fertility rates had been low to begin with.

The total fertility rate is derived by aggregating the agespecific fertility rates of females in each of the reproductive ages. This provides an indication of the average number of children a woman would bear during the whole of her reproductive life span on the basis of the existing fertility pattern. The gross reproduction rate is similarly computed on the basis of female births only. The total fertility rate fell from 3,086 per thousand in 1970 to 1,737 per thousand in 1980.

# Marriages

Registration of all marriages is compulsory in Singapore. Marriages other than Muslim marriages are registered under the Women's Charter, 1961. Notices of such marriages have to be lodged with the Registrar of Marriages irrespective of the venue of solemnization.

The average age of grooms married under the Women's Charter declined marginally from 28.1 to 27.9 years while that for the brides increased from 24.1 to 24.7 years during the period 1970-1980.

Registration of Muslim marriages in Singapore became compulsory from 1 July 1909 when the Mohammadan Marriage Ordinance, 1908 (Ordinance No. XXV of 1908) was enacted. This Ordinance was subsequently repealed and replaced by the Administration of Muslim Law Act, 1966.

The average age of grooms married under the Muslim Law Act fell slightly from 27.7 years in 1970 to 27.3 years in 1980 while that of brides increased from 22.3 to 23.8 years during the same period.

## 3. LABOUR AND EMPLOYMENT

#### Labour Force

Data on labour force prior to 1973 (Table 3.1) were estimated using bench-mark data obtained in the 1966 Sample Household Survey conducted jointly by the Economic Research Centre, University of Singapore and the Ministry of National Development, the 1972/73 Household Sample Survey and the 1970 Census of Population conducted by the Department of Statistics. The 1973 data were based on the Labour Force Sample Survey conducted by the Department of Statistics.

Data for 1974 to 1979 were based on the annual labour force surveys conducted by the Ministry of Labour in June of each year, whereas data for 1980 were based on the 1980 Census of Population conducted by the Department of Statistics.

The main terms used in the data

on labour force are defined as follows:

Employed Persons: Persons aged ten years and over who, during the reference week, worked for pay or profit or for family gains as well as those who did not work but had a job to return to. Employed persons include employers, employees, own account workers and unpaid family workers.

Unemployed Persons: Persons aged ten years and over who, during the reference week, did not work and did not have a job to return to but were actively looking for a job. It also includes persons who were not working but were taking steps to start their own business.

Economically Inactive Persons: Persons aged ten years and over who, during the reference week, did not work or did not have a job to return to and at the same time were not actively looking for a job.

Age-Sex Specific Participation Rate: Percentage of economically active population to the total population in the specific age groups.

Unemployment Rate: Percentage of unemployed persons to the total economically active population.

The classification of industries used in the 1980 Census was based on the Singapore Standard Industrial Classification, 1978 and the occupational groups used were based on the Singapore Standard Occupational Classification, 1978.

### Employment Service

The Employment Service Department of the Ministry of Labour provides free services for persons seeking employment as well as assists employers to recruit workers.

Registration for employment as-

sistance at the Service is voluntary. Registrants are required to inform the Service within seven days upon securing employment. They are expected to renew their registration every six months if they are still unemployed. Those who do not renew their registration or could not be located are taken off the 'live' register. In addition, the Employment Service checks all registrants' employment status using employment records maintained by the Central Provident Fund (CPF) Board. Registrants (Singapore citizens and permanent residents) found to be holding jobs are similarly removed from the 'live' register.

# Weekly Earnings and Hours Worked

Data on weekly earnings and hours worked are based on information supplied by establishments in the Weekly Hours and Earnings Surveys conducted by the Research and Statistics Division of the Ministry of Labour.

The main terms used in the survey are defined as follows:

Weekly Earnings: They include wages/salaries, overtime payments as well as all other monetary payments earned by workers during the reference week of the survey. Wages/salaries refer to basic wages accrued to workers before all deductions such as their CPF contributions and personal income tax. All other monetary payments include leave allowance, cash allowances for food, housing and others but exclude payments-in-kind, payroll tax and the employers' CPF contributions.

Weekly Hours: They refer to the sum of standard working hours and overtime hours of work during the reference week of the survey.

#### Trade Unions

Data on trade unions and membership are compiled from returns submitted to the Registrar of Trade Unions and covered both employees' and employers' unions.

## Trade Disputes

Data on trade disputes only relate to cases referred to the Labour Relations Division of the Ministry of Labour.

A trade dispute means any dispute between/among employees and employers connected with the employment or non-employment or the terms of employment or the conditions of work of any person.

# Industrial Stoppages

Data on industrial stoppages refer to cases reported to and handled by the Industrial Relations Department of the Ministry of Labour and include both strikes and lockouts.

#### Central Provident Fund

The Central Provident Fund, es-

tablished in 1955, is a compulsory savings scheme to provide workers in Singapore with monetary benefits when they attain the age of 55 years or become permanently disabled. Non-citizens are permitted to withdraw their funds when they leave Singapore and Peninsular Malaysia permanently with no intention to return. Members can also use their deposits to purchase flats under the various approved public housing schemes and shares of Singapore Bus Services

(1978) Ltd. Employers are required to pay monthly contributions to the Fund for every employee. However, it is not mandatory for certain categories of persons such as employers, self-employed persons, and unpaid family workers to be a member of the scheme.

The rates of contribution payable to the Fund from 1 July 1980 for employment in the private sector are shown as follows:

The whole of the contribution shown in column (2) is payable by the employer but the employer is entitled, where applicable, to deduct from his employee's wages the amount shown in column (3) as the employee's share of the contribution.

For employees earning more than \$200 a month, a portion of the CPF contribution equivalent to 6.5 per cent of wages are credited into the members' special account. For those earning more than \$50 but less than \$200, the corresponding portion is 4.5 per cent. Money in the special account cannot be used by members to purchase flats under the various approved housing schemes or to purchase shares of Singapore Bus Service (1978) Ltd. This is to ensure that members who have utilised their CPF monies to purchase flats or shares have some savings when they retire.

## 4. NATIONAL INCOME AND BALANCE OF PAYMENTS

#### National Accounts

The output and expenditure approaches are adopted for compiling national income aggregates of Singapore. The compilation followed closely the concepts, definitions and methodology given in the United Nations' publication "A System of National Accounts, 1968".

The development of the Singapore economy depends heavily on
foreign capital, foreign technology
and foreign workers. Consequently a
large share of the compensation of
employees and of the operating
surplus as well as the consumption
of fixed capital of establishments
as recorded in national accounts,
accrues to foreigners and foreign
enterprises.

As such, per capita GNP as conventionally defined on a residential basis is not a true reflection of the income of Singaporeans. Hence a new series on indigenous per capita GNP which excludes the foreigners' contribution was compiled. This involves the calculation of income accruing to foreign workers and foreign enterprises which are residents of Singapore and the exclusion of this amount from the GDP. The indigenous per capita GNP for the years 1973 and 1974 were evaluated and accepted by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and used as the basis for classifying Singapore as a developing country.

#### Definitions:

Gross National Product - The aggregate value of output produced by productive factors owned by Singapore residents irrespective of whether they are located within Singapore's geographical boundary or abroad.

Indigenous Gross National Product - The aggregate value of output produced by Singaporeans.

Gross Domestic Product - The aggregate value of output produced within the domestic territory of Singapore.

Expenditure on Gross Domestic Product - The sum of private consumption expenditure of households including non-profit making institutions, government consumption expenditure, gross domestic capital formation and net exports to rest of the world.

Output and Expenditure GDP Deflators - The ratios of current price estimates to the corresponding estimates at 1968 prices. They measure implicitly the price changes in the current price aggregates.

GNP, GDP and expenditure on GDP

are valued at market prices, that is, they are valued at the actual transacted prices and included customs and excise duties and other indirect taxes levied but exclude government grants and subsidies.

## Balance of Payments

Singapore's balance of payments records all economic transactions between residents of Singapore and residents of the rest of the world (non-residents). The methods used in the compilation are based on the principles recommended in the Balance of Payments Manual published by the International Monetary Fund (IMF). The estimates are compiled mainly from trade and shipping statistics, data obtained from regular surveys of companies, administrative records of government departments and statutory authorities as well as data collected under the Ticket System. The Ticket System was implemented by the Monetary Authority of Singapore in July 1973

to collect statistics on Singapore's overseas transactions through banks operating in Singapore.

Transactions entered into Singapore's balance of payments are classified under three main categories, viz:

- (a) Transactions in goods and services such as exports and imports of merchandise, receipts from services rendered to or payments for services received from nonresidents;
- (b) Unrequited transfers which record private remittances to and from abroad as well as government receipts of grants from and payments of pensions and compensation to non-residents;
- (c) Private and official finan-

cial transactions involving changes in Singapore's foreign assets and liabilities.

Transactions in goods and services and unrequited transfers which are related to Singapore's current income and expenditure are grouped in the current account, whereas private and official financial transactions which affect Singapore's claims on and liabilities to non-residents are classified in the capital account.

As a result of improvements made in the system of data collection and the availability of supplementary data, the estimates for some transactions in the current account from 1972 onwards were revised and are thus not comparable with those of earlier years for which additional retrospective data were not available.

## 5. AGRICULTURE, LIVESTOCK AND FISHERIES

#### General

The agricultural sector of Singapore is engaged mainly in the production of vegetables, pig, poultry, eggs and fish. It is estimated that about 13.1 per cent of Singapore's total land area are used for agricultural purposes. Most of the agricultural establishments are engaged in mixed farming where cultivation of vegetables is carried out together with rearing of livestock.

#### Horticulture

The majority of our horticultural farms are engaged in vegetable production. The main vegetables grown include leafy vegetables such as cai xin, gai lan and weng cai and fruit vegetables such as brinjals, cucumbers and long beans. Root crops such as tapioca and sweet potatoes are also produced in small quantities. Local farms supply some 26 per cent of the total vegetable consumption. Many farms also plant fruit trees both for shade and for production. Singapore is world renowned for her export of good quality orchids.

#### Livestock

Pig, poultry and egg production are the most important farming activities in Singapore which account for more than three-quarters of the total ex-farm value of primary production. Singapore is self-sufficient in fresh pork and eggs. About 78 per cent of the poultry meat consumption are also produced by local farms. Furthermore, Singapore is also the main distribution centre of day-old chicks in the region, exporting about \$7.1 million worth of them in 1980.

Livestock are slaughtered at the abattoirs in Jurong and Kim Chuan Road under the close supervision of the Veterinary Division of the Primary Production Department.

## Fisheries

pends on her neighbouring countries for fish supply. Local production remained rather stable in the past few years. Of 56,799 tonnes of fish consumed in 1980, 16,043 tonnes were produced locally and the rest were imported mainly from Malaysia. Local production of fish comes from inshore and offshore catches. Fishing around Singapore waters normally using non-powered boats powered with out-board engines, is classified as inshore fishing and the bulk of such

catches are from kelongs, drift nets and beach seines. Offshore fishing is mainly carried out in the South China Sea and part of the Indian Ocean. The most commonly used offshore fishing gear are otter trawls and bottom long lines for demersal fish and troll lines for pelagic fish.

Auctioning of fish is carried out mainly at the Jurong Fishing Port. A relatively small quantity of local landings are auctioned at the Kangkar Fish Market and Bedok Fisheries Centre.

Singapore is well-known for her aquarium fish production. The value of aquarium fish exported in 1980 reached \$36.1 million.

### 6. INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION

#### Census of Industrial Production

A census of manufacturing establishments employing ten or more workers in the private and public sectors is conducted annually by the Department of Statistics. These establishments account for over 95 per cent of all industrial activities. The census results provide comprehensive data for the study of changes in structure and trends of growth of the industrial sector.

The statistical unit used in the census is the establishment, defined as a manufacturing unit engaged in one industrial activity and generally at one location. Establishments are classified in accordance with the Singapore Standard Industrial Classification of All Economic Activities 1969 which is adapted from the International Standard Industrial Classification of All Economic Activities of the

United Nations.

The main terms used in the annual census of industrial production are defined as follows:

Workers: They include all persons engaged directly or indirectly in the industrial activity of the establishment, that is, all employees, working proprietors, and unpaid family workers. Data generally refer to number as at 30 June, except where establishments commenced operation after June.

Employees: They include (i) all workmen whether skilled, semiskilled and unskilled, employed directly in the process of production and (ii) other workers who are paid personnel employed indirectly in the production process and include working directors, managers, supervi-

sors, and technical and clerical staff.

Working Proprietors and Unpaid Family Workers: This group includes proprietors and business partners actively engaged in the operation of the establishment and their relatives working in the establishment without regular remuneration.

Input: Value of input covers cost of materials, electricity, water, fuel (excluding fuel for vehicles) and inward transport charges.

Output: Value of output refers to the total value of all commodities and services produced at ex-factory prices.

Value Added: Value added is estimated as the value of output less that of total input (including the value of work given out).

## Quarterly Index of Production

The Quarterly Index of Production of manufacturing establishments was rebased in 1980, using the weighting pattern derived from the 1978 Census of Industrial Production. Production data for the four quarters of 1978 were collected and the average was used as a comparison base for the series. The Laspeyres formula is used for the compilation of the index.

The Quarterly Index of Production covers all manufacturing activities classified under Division 3 of the Singapore Standard Classification of All Economic Activities, 1969. Granite quarrying, production of electricity and gas, and construction activity are not covered by the index.

## 7. ELECTRICITY, GAS AND WATER SUPPLY

The Public Utilities Board is responsible for the production and distribution of electricity, gas and water in Singapore.

# Electricity

Electricity is generated normally by steam plants at the Senoko, Jurong and Pasir Panjang 'B' Power Stations. The St James and Senoko Gas Turbine Generating Stations act as reserves. The Senoko Power Station contributed most (62.1 per cent) to the total production of electricity. This station will be further enlarged with the acquisition of two 250 megawatt (MW) turbine-generators and matching reheat boiler under the Stage III project.

In 1980 the total generating capacity of the Board's power stations decreased by 50 MW or 2.4 per cent to 2,010 MW after the Pasir

Panjang 'A' Power Station was closed.

A network of 230 kilovolt (kV). 66 kV, 6.6 kV and low tension cables interlinked by transformer substations forms the transmission and distribution system whereby electricity is supplied from the power stations to the consumers. The length of the network grew to 31,463 kilometres (km) of electric cables with an increase of 1,250 km in 1980. Of these, 149 km were reinforcements to the 230 kV transmission ring. There was also a net increase of 148 substation buildings giving a total of 2,850 at the end of 1980. The total transformer capacity increased by 6.4 per cent to 10,475 megavolt amperes (MVA).

The total number of consumers increased to 561,708 whilst their consumption rose to 6,198 million kilowatt hours (kW h).

Gas

Gas is produced by 5 naphtha reformers at the Kallang Gasworks with an installed capacity of 0.586 million cubic metres per day. Excess gas produced during off-peak periods is stored in the holders in Kallang and Queenstown and used to supplement the supply during the peak demand periods. There is a total of 1,316 kilometres of gas mains in use. Some housing and industrial estates outside the town gas distribution network receive their gas supply from Liquefied Petroleum Gas stored in system tanks. Distribution of bottled gas is done by private companies for domestic use but data on these are not included in the

#### Water

Water supplies are drawn mainly from 7 impounding reservoirs in Singapore and 4 in Johore with a total maximum storage capacity of 100.1 million cubic metres. Water is also tapped from rivers in Johore. After purification and treatment, water is pumped into 11 service reservoirs from whence distribution is made to consumers.

### 8. BUILDING CONSTRUCTION AND HOUSING

## **Building Construction**

Statistics on building construction relating to number of units, floor area and value buildings commenced, under construction, and completed are compiled by the Department of Statistics. These are based on quarterly surveys of building activity covering architects and developers in the private sector who have building plans approved by the Building Control Division of the Public Works Department. For the public sector, similar information is compiled from monthly returns submitted by the relevant government departments and statutory boards.

A building is considered 'commenced' if piling work has been started or demarcation of boundary made. A building is considered 'completed' if it is ready for use or occupation and power and water facilities are available.

Statistics on building activity are revised retrospectively every quarter based on up-to-date information obtained from the latest quarterly survey. The revision reflects primarily changes and amendments in building plans.

## Housing and Development Board

The Housing and Development Board (HDB) is the premier public housing authority of the Republic of Singapore. Over 50,000, 60,000, 113,000 and 130,000 housing units were completed during the First (1960-65), Second (1966-70), Third (1971-75) and Fourth (1976-80) Five-Year Building Programmes respectively. In 1980, 22,030 housing units were completed by the Board, bringing the total units completed between 1960 and 1980 to 340,000

dwelling units. By the end of 31 Mar 1981, 69 per cent of Singapore's total population was housed in HDB flats.

The Board is responsible for the planning and development of new towns and housing estates and the provision of communal facilities such as sports and swimming complexes, commercial, shopping and social facilities. The Board acquires land for public housing, clears designated areas for redevelopment, and resettles families, shopkeepers and farmers on State Lands needed for redevelopment projects such as public housing, urban renewal, airport expansion and road schemes.

In addition to the completed new towns at Queenstown (150,000 residents), Toa Payoh (190,000) and Telok Blangah (70,000), the Board will be completing three more new generation towns at the end of the Fourth Five-Year Building Programme

in 1980, viz, Ang Mo Kio (245,000), Bedok (237,000) and Clementi (122,500). Another five new towns under development are at Woodlands, Yishun, Hougang, Jurong East/West and Tampines.

Management of the estates is on a decentralised basis with 28 Area Offices located within the various estates throughout Singapore. Rentals and instalment payments for HDB flats are collected at Area Offices. Shops and eating places are generally located on the ground floor and are allocated by public tender for the purpose of carrying on trade or business.

Housing units managed by the Board are classified according to the number of rooms in each flat. For this purpose, besides the bedrooms, a living room or dining room space is also counted as a room. All units have, in addition, kitchen space and bathroom/toilet facilities.

### 9. EXTERNAL TRADE

#### Source of Data

Statistics on the external trade of Singapore are compiled by the Department of Statistics from import and export declarations which are submitted to the Controller and Registrar of Imports and Exports, or the Comptroller of Customs and Excise, Singapore, except for the following:

- (i) Postal packages which are based on particulars furnished by the Postal Authorities; and
- (ii) Bunkers and stores supplied to non-Singapore registered ships and aircraft, which are compiled from statements furnished by ships' and aircraft agents to the Department of Statistics.

### Coverage

The "general" system of recording trade statistics is adopted in Singapore. Under this system, all goods imported into or exported from Singapore are included in the external trade statistics except the following:

- (i) All transhipment cargo on through bills of lading or through air waybills;
- (ii) Fish and other marine produce landed by Singapore and Peninsular Malaysian registered vessels direct from sea;
- (iii) Goods imported and exported by, or on behalf of, diplomatic services and Armed Forces;

- (iv) Exposed cinematographic
   films imported or expor ted on rental basis;
  - (v) Television news films, news or press materials;
- (vi) Animals and vehicles temporarily brought in or out for races or competitions;
- (vii) Goods temporarily imported or exported solely for exhibition purposes and intended to be returned after the exhibition;
  - (viii) Ships and aircraft arriving for or departing after repair;
    - (ix) Containers, cylinders,
       bottles and the like
       specified as returnable;
    - (x) Personal and household effects accompanying

passengers or crews;

- (xi) Samples, gifts and specimens for test or analysis not exceeding the value of \$300;
- (xii) Gold bullion; and
- (xiii) Issued currency notes and coins.

Ships and aircraft are included if they are imported or exported as merchandise purchased or sold by an owner in Singapore whether or not they arrived or departed under their own power. Bunker fuel and stores supplied to ships and aircraft of non-Singapore registration are included in these statistics.

Goods in transit through Singapore between countries other than Peninsular Malaysia are excluded. But goods via Singapore to or from Peninsular Malaysia are recorded as imports and subsequently as exports. Goods are regarded as in transit when they are brought into Singapore for the sole purpose of transhipment and remain in the custody of the carrier agents or the Port Authority while in Singapore. Goods transhipped by sea (ship to ship) at Singapore between other countries and Peninsular Malaysia have, however, been excluded from the external trade statistics since 1968.

#### Definitions and Terms Used

'Imports' refer to all goods brought into Singapore, except those specified as excluded under the Coverage section, irrespective of whether they are for consumption, for processing, for use in manufacturing, or for subsequent re-shipment to other countries.

'Exports' refer to all goods taken out of Singapore, except those specified as excluded under the Coverage section.

'Domestic Exports' refer to exports of Singapore origin and comprise (i) primary commodities grown or produced in Singapore; and (ii) goods which have been transformed, that is, manufactured, assembled or processed in Singapore including those with imported materials or parts.

#### Valuation

Imports from and exports to countries are valued at cif and fob respectively. For trade with Peninsular Malaysia prior to 1975, imports into Singapore were valued fob Peninsular Malaysia and exports from Singapore were valued cif Peninsular Malaysia.

### Classification

With effect from 1 January 1979, the trade classification adopted for documenting Singapore external trade is the Singapore Trade Classification and Customs Duties, 1979, which is based on Customs Co-

operation Council Nomenclature (CCCN). However, for the publication of external trade statistics, a classification based on the Standard International Trade Classification (Revision 2) is used. Imports are classified by country of origin and exports by country of destination.

## 10. TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION

### Vessels Entered and Cleared

Data on the movement of vessels are compiled from declarations submitted to the Port Master (to Director of Marine prior to April 1973) by all merchant ships except fishing vessels entering or leaving Singapore waters. The data are given in number and net registered tonnage which is the close-in space for cargo and passenger accommodation.

# Cargo Discharged and Loaded

Volume of cargo handled refers to those discharged and loaded at all parts of Singapore and is based on cargo summaries submitted to the Manifest Section of the Import and Export Office. The data include transhipment cargo but exclude military stores. Data on "mineral oilin-bulk" cover crude and refined petroleum carried by tankers

discharged or loaded at the oil refineries, but exclude bunker fuel supplied to vessels. All other cargo, including vegetable oil-in-bulk, bulk cement, bulk wheat, bulk latex and live animals are shown as "General Cargo and Other Bulk Cargo".

#### Civil Air Traffic

All traffic movements are compiled from data supplied by the Department of Civil Aviation and relate primarily to passengers, freight and mail on commercial flights handled at the Paya Lebar International Airport and Seletar Aerodrome.

### Passenger Movements

Data on arrivals and departures of passengers are compiled from

returns submitted by airline and shipping agents and cover all persons except those travelling between Singapore and Peninsular Malaysia.

Data on visitors are compiled from immigration disembarkation forms submitted by all persons arriving in Singapore at the points of entry.

#### Roads

Data on public roads refer to the length of roads in kilometres and are classified into major arterial roads, collector roads and local roads.

Major Arterial Roads - Rural highways and expressways entering the city area, principal road network for through traffic and roads linking principal areas of traffic generation.

Collector Roads - Distributor

and collector roads serving traffic between major arterial roads and local streets and also those used mainly for traffic movements between adjacent residential, commercial and industrial areas.

Local Roads - Roads used primarily for access to residential, commercial and industrial areas.

# Vehicles Registered

Registration of vehicles is compulsory and except for bicycles, licensing is renewable every six months or a year with the Registry of Vehicles.

### Road Casualties

Data on road casualties are compiled from reports made to the Police on all traffic accidents occurring on roads.

### 11. FINANCE AND INSURANCE

## Banking

Banking Statistics are compiled from returns submitted by banks operating in Singapore to the Monetary Authority of Singapore. Prior to the establishment of the Authority on 1 January 1971, the banking schedules were submitted to the Commissioner of Banking under the Ministry of Finance.

# Finance Companies

Finance Companies Statistics are compiled from monthly returns submitted to The Monetary Authority of Singapore under the Finance Companies Act. Prior to the formation of the Authority in January 1971, these statistical returns were submitted to the Commissioner of Finance Companies under the Ministry of Finance.

### Asian Dollar Market

The Asian dollar market was officially established in October 1968 when approval was first given for a bank to operate an Asian Currency Unit (ACU). Since then, a number of merchant banks have also been given approval to operate ACUs. Data on ACUs are compiled from returns submitted regularly by the ACU operators to the Monetary Authority of Singapore.

#### Insurance

Data on insurance are compiled by The Monetary Authority of Singapore from returns submitted by all insurance companies in Singapore.

## Post Office Savings Bank

The Post Office Savings Bank of

Singapore is incorporated under the Post Office Savings Bank of Singapore Act, 1971. The principal objectives of the Bank are to provide a means for the deposit of savings, to encourage thrift and to mobilize domestic savings for the purpose of

public development. Its savings are fully guaranteed by the Government.

### 12. PUBLIC FINANCE

## Government Revenue and Expenditure

The main revenue collecting departments are the Customs and Excise Department and the Inland Revenue Department. The former is responsible for the collection of import and excise duties on liquor, tobacco, petroleum, motor vehicles and film hire and entertainment duties. The Inland Revenue Department is responsible for the collection of taxes on income and property, estate and stamp duties and duties on sweepstakes and lotteries.

Personal income tax in Singapore is based on a progressive scale
applied to the previous year's
chargeable income after the appropriate deductions have been made.
Deductions include allowances for
personal relief, earned income,
maintenance of wife, children and
dependants, life insurance premiums
and contributions to Central Provi-

dent Fund. Company taxes are based on a flat rate of 40 per cent of income with the usual allowances. In addition, special tax exemptions and liberal depreciation allowances are provided to pioneer companies and other export-orientated firms. The Government has also entered into double taxation agreements with countries which have trading and other interests in Singapore.

Government revenue is credited to the Consolidated Revenue Account and current expenditure is paid out of this Account.

# Development Fund

The Development Fund was established in 1960 and receipts from revenue allocation for development, loans and grants, and other sources available for development financing are credited to this account. All payments for development expenditure by the Government and of loans to

statutory authorities to finance part of their development needs are paid out of this Fund.

# 13. PRICES

#### Consumer Price Index

The Consumer Price Index (June 1977-May 1978 = 100) was compiled on the basis of a list of items and weighting pattern derived from the Household Expenditure Survey conducted from June 1977 to May 1978. The records of expenditure of 4,033 households (constituting 87 per cent of all households covered in the survey) with monthly expenditure between \$100 and \$1,499 were used as the weighting pattern. The index, a weighted arithmetic average of price relatives, is computed monthly and the yearly index is a simple average of twelve monthly indexes.

## Retail Prices

Retail prices of goods are collected regularly from markets, supermarkets, provision shops and other retail outlets spread over the entire island. Prices are collected thrice weekly for perishable food items such as fish, vegetables, meat and poultry, and weekly for sundries and provisions. Clothing materials and some miscellaneous items including items of services are priced monthly while items with infrequent price fluctuations are either checked half-yearly or yearly.

### Wholesale Price Indexes

The series of wholesale price indexes (1974 = 100) consist of the General Wholesale Price Index and Indexes on Singapore manufactured products, imported products, building materials and local farm products. The list of items and weighting patterns for the series were derived from data collected in the 1973 Census of Industrial Production and/or the 1973 external trade statistics except those for the

local farm products series which were based on data supplied by the Primary Production Department. The weights for the General Wholesale Price Index were made proportionate to the combined value of retained imports and locally manufactured goods sold in the domestic market and those for the building materials entering the building and construction industries. The weights for the Singapore manufactured products and the imported products series were respectively derived according to the value of production and imports in 1973.

A wholesale price index on exported products with base 1978=100 was constructed in 1980. The list of items and weighting pattern for this index were derived from the 1978 export statistics.

### Wholesale Prices

Wholesale prices of rubber are supplied weekly by the Rubber Association of Singapore. In the case of palm oil, prices were, prior to March 1972, supplied monthly by Messrs Kumpulan Guthrie Sdn Bhd and since then by the Malaysian Palm Oil Producers Association. For other types of produce, weekly prices were, prior to 1971, obtained from the Singapore International Chamber of Commerce and currently from the Singapore Chinese Produce Exchange.

# Primary Education

Primary education for a child is free and begins at the age of six.

The New Education System for primary education was implemented in January 1980. Under this system, the first three years of primary education emphasise on the learning of languages instead of the acquisition of factual knowledge. This is to give pupils a strong language foundation for the learning of mathematics, science and other subjects. At the end of primary three, pupils will be streamed into the normal bilingual course, the extended bilingual course or the monolingual course. Pupils in the normal and extended bilingual courses will sit for the Primary School Leaving Examinations at the end of the sixth year and eighth year respectively. Pupils in the monolingual course will study another five years before they sit for an examination leading to a certificate. After that they can join the Vocational and Industrial Training Board for vocational training.

# Secondary Education

The New Education System for secondary education was implemented in January 1981. Under this system, pupils are streamed into secondary special, secondary express and secondary normal courses according to their performance in the Primary School Leaving Examinations. Pupils in the secondary special course do both English and Chinese at the first language level while the pupils in both the secondary express and normal courses do two languages

at the first and second language levels respectively. Pupils in the secondary special and express courses will sit for the General Certificate of Education 'Ordinary' Level Examinations at the end of the fourth year before proceeding to the pre-university courses. Pupils in the secondary normal course follow a modified curriculum. At the end of the fourth year, they will sit for the Certificate of Secondary Education Examinations. Those who have done well in these examinations may proceed to sit for the General Certificate of Education 'Ordinary' Level Examinations after an extra year of study The others may go for vocational training or take up employment.

The secondary one and two pupils in the special, express and normal courses study the same number of subjects. The curriculum time allocated to a particular subject in each of the courses are the same.

However, the syllabus to be covered for each subject vary with each of the courses. After completing secondary two, all pupils have the choice of taking any combination of compulsory subjects and elective subjects depending on their interests and aptitudes.

At the pre-university levels, pupils will be streamed into a twoyear course in junior colleges or a three-year course in pre-university school centres. Pupils who are good in English and performed well in their General Certificate of Education 'Ordinary' Level Examinations will be streamed into the two-year course. They are also required to do well in their second language. Those who are weak in English will do the three-year course. They have to spend a significant proportion of their curriculum time on learning the language so as to achieve a better grounding in it.

# Vocational and Industrial Training

Vocational and industrial training in Singapore is provided for by the VITB under its training institutions and apprenticeship training schemes. Apart from supervising young persons undergoing apprenticeship and traineeship schemes, the training, retraining and upgrading of workers are also provided for.

The VITB runs 19 training institutes and centres and offers full-time and part-time courses in more than 60 types of vocational and industrial skills at the following levels: Diploma in Applied Arts, the Industrial Technician Certificate, the Commercial Education Certificate, the National Trade Certificate, the National Trade Certificate, Grades 3, 2 and 1 and the Certificate of Competency. Under its continuing education programmes the VITB offers vocational skill development, academic, language and personal enrichment courses.

# Tertiary Education

The tertiary institutions in Singapore are the National University of Singapore, the Singapore Polytechnic, the Ngee Ann Technical College and the Institute of Education.

The National University of Singapore was established on 8 August 1980 following the merger of the University of Singapore and Nanyang University. The University offers degree courses in Arts, Social Sciences, Law, Science, Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy, Engineering (including Chemical Engineering), Architecture, Building, Estate Management, Accountancy and Business Administration. Higher degree courses are offered in all faculties. There is also a post graduate diploma course in Rusiness Administration. Courses leading to the Diploma in Education and higher degrees in Education which are awarded by the University, are conducted at

the Institute of Education. The course leading to the University's Masters degree in Applied Linguistics is conducted at the Regional Language Centre.

The Singapore Polytechnic offers technician diploma courses in civil, electrical, electronics and communication, mechanical, production, marine and structural engineering, architectural draughtsmanship, building, land surveying and chemical process technology. There are also technician certificate courses in architectural draughtsmanship, aeronautical maintenance engineering and maritime radio-communications. In addition, there are posttechnician certificate and diploma courses in industrial management and a pre-sea induction course.

The Ngee Ann Technical College conducts courses at the engineering technician level leading to the Technician Diploma in Mechanical Engineering, Electrical and Electronic Engineering, Shipbuilding and Repair Technology and Building Maintenance and Management. The College also offers a Business Studies course at the middle-management level leading to the Diploma in Business Studies. In addition, parttime courses are conducted in industrial management, marketing management, ship draughtsmanship, naval architecture, ship construction and welding technology.

The Institute of Education provides training for pre-primary, primary and secondary school teachers in all the four official languages and conducts in-service and upgrading courses for the development of qualified teachers. The Institute also conducts ad hoc courses for other organisations and educational research relevant to Singapore's needs.

## Expenditure on Education

Education has been a major item of public expenditure and its provi-

sion has been increasing steadily. The total recurrent expenditure in the fiscal year 1980/81 was \$606 million.

The provision of health services by the Government in Singapore is very comprehensive. The Ministry of Health is responsible for the overall policy on health matters, the maintenance of public health standards, the development of health programmes and preventive measures and the provision of treatment and hospital facilities. In addition, the Singapore Family Planning and Population Board provides family planning advice and facilities.

The Ministry of Health is providing four main services, namely, Primary Health Care Services, Hospital Services, Other Medical and Supporting Services, and Dental Services to the general public.

# Primary Health Care Services

The Primary Health Care Services which include Outpatient, Maternal and Child Health and School Health Services are provided at 27 outpatient dispensaries and 29 maternal and child health clinics. The outpatient dispensaries offer general curative treatment while maternal and child health clinics concentrate on preventive health care for women of child-bearing age and pre-school children, implementing family planning programmes and immunization programmes for preschool children. Health screening and immunization for school children is undertaken by School Health Services.

# **Hospital Services**

There are 13 Government hospitals of which 6 are general hospitals providing multi-disciplinary treatment and 7 specialist hospitals providing specialist treatment in obstetrics and gynaecology, psychia-

try, skin and infectious diseases. In addition, there are 13 private hospitals catering for the medical needs of the people.

# Other Medical and Supporting Services

These are provided by the Radiology and Radiotherapy Department, Pathology Department, Blood Transfusion Service, Rehabilitation Services (including physiotherapy, occupational therapy and speech therapy), Medical Social Services and Pharmaceutical Services.

#### Dental Services

The Dental Services provide curative and preventive dental treatment at 135 dental clinics located at various hospitals, outpatient/maternal and child health clinics and schools.

### Medical Personnel


Data on medical personnel refer to the number of doctors, dentists, pharmacists, nurses and mid-wives registered under the respective Acts, namely, The Medical Registration Act, the Registration of Dentists Act, the Registration of Pharmacists Act, the Nurses Registration Act and the Mid-Wives Act.

# Family Planning

The Singapore Family Planning and Population Board (SFPPB) was established in January 1966. The Board is responsible for matters pertaining to family planning and the implementation of the Government's National Family Planning and Population Programme.

The Board provides facilities for the full range of family planning methods comprising oral contraceptive pill, condom, intra-uterine contraceptive device (IUD), hormonal injection (Depoprovera), diaphragm and spermicide through a comprehen-

sive network of 29 Maternal and Child Health/Family Planning Clinics.

## 16. CULTURE AND RECREATION

#### Radio and Television

The Singapore Broadcasting Corporation (SBC) was established on 1 February 1980 to take over the Broadcasting Department's function of providing radio and television services. Educational and entertainment programmes as well as other types of information are transmitted in all four official languages, namely, Malay, Chinese, Tamil and English. Commercial broadcasting is also incorporated in the services.

Each language service of the radio service of the SBC operates on a separate channel, both on AM (medium and shortwave bands) and FM in the VHF Band II. A FM Stereo Service was introduced in July 1969 and mainly music is featured over this service.

Television services were first

introduced in Singapore in February 1963. Programmes are transmitted on two channels in all the official languages and are usually subtitled in one other language to cater for a greater number of viewers.

The conversion of the television service from monochrome to colour began on 2 May 1974 with trade and test transmissions. On 1 August 1974, the "pilot" colour service utilizing only film material was introduced. In the last few years the proportion of colour transmission time has doubled, from 43 per cent in August 1975 to 86 per cent in August 1979. The transmission in black and white is confined to occasional feature films and some serials televised during off-peak hours. News and newsreels, locally produced documentaries, most 'live' or pre-recorded outside telecasts and all local studio productions are now televised in colour.

Under the Singapore Broadcasting Corporation Act, 1979, a licence has to be obtained by all persons using a radio and/or television receiver at any place of residence, premises or in a motor vehicle. A licence permits the use of one or more television receivers and one or more radios in any one place of residence. The current annual licence fee is \$36 for a monochrome TV set, \$54 for a colour set and \$12 for a radio receiver only.

The Rediffusion Service, a private undertaking, provides direct sound broadcasts via cable to subscribers. The monthly rental fee to subscribers is \$8.50 per set.

#### Cinema

Data on cinemas are obtained from the Customs and Excise Department. Under the Entertainment Duty Act, all cinemas are liable to pay entertainment duty according to their admission charges. Total attendances are based on the number

of admissions.

# Library

The National Library, both a national and public library maintained by the Government, provides essential library facilities as well as a variety of cultural, educational and recreational programmes for the community. In addition to the central library at Stamford Road, there are full-time branch libraries in Marine Parade, Queenstown and Toa Payoh, part-time branch libraries in Bedok, Siglap and Jurong and three mobile library vehicles providing weekly services to 11 community centres.

The Library maintains, in addition to the normal stock of books, collections of special interest for research and other purposes as well as periodicals, newspapers, music scores, braille and large print books, etc. The Library also has a microfilm unit and many documents and publications are on microfilm.
